## CORONER'S JURY RENDERS VERDICT

**Minds that Frank Mason Died  
From Overdose of Morphine  
—Not a Suicide.**

## TWO WOMEN WANT DIVORCE

**From Wayward Spouses—Littlefield  
Held for Assault—Death Claims  
Michael Rogan.**

Ogden, Utah, Jan. 10.—A coroner's inquest was held yesterday afternoon before Judge Murphy and a jury composed of T. B. Herrick, A. J. Watts and J. L. Stone over the remains of Frank Mason, who was found dead in bed Sunday evening at the Allen rooming house. A number of witnesses were examined whose testimony went to show that deceased came to Ogden a day or so before Christmas and registered at the Allen rooming house where he stepped up to the time of his death. Mr. and Mrs. Allen stated that he was a quiet man, who minded his own business and never intimated that he was used of his life. The last time they saw him was Thursday last until his lifeless form was found last Sunday evening. A bottle with a small amount of morphine in it was shown. Mr. Allen who identified it as a bottle he found in the bed occupied by Mason.

Undertaker Larkin testified to the condition of Mr. Mason's body, which indicated poisoning. The jury after considering the evidence brought in a verdict that deceased came to his death from an overdose of morphine administered for medicinal purposes. No arrangements for the burial of the body have yet been made.

## WANT DIVORCES.

**Two Women Seek Legal Separation for  
Deserting Spouses.**

Ogden, Jan. 10.—Mrs. Gertrude Blanchard has commenced divorce proceedings in the Second district court against Harry C. Blanchard. The complaint alleges that the plaintiff and defendant were married June 23, 1902, at Brigham City, Utah, and that one child is living as issue of said marriage, aged two and a half years. That defendant is an habitual drunkard and has deserted his wife and child and has failed to provide them with the common necessities of life, forcing plaintiff to provide for herself and child. Wherefore plaintiff asks for a decree of divorce, custody of said minor child and such other relief as the court may deem just.

A suit for divorce has been filed in the district court by Mary E. Billings against William A. Billings. The allegations of the complaint are that the parties to the suit were married Jan. 16, 1871, at Hart county, Missouri; that they lived together until 1897 when the defendant wilfully abandoned his wife and children and has ever since failed to provide his family with the necessities of life or to live with them; wherefore plaintiff prays for the dissolution of bonds of matrimony existing between herself and husband, and for such other relief as the court may deem just.

Petition has been filed in the district court by Martha Moynahan praying for her appointment as administratrix of the estate of Patrick Moynahan who died Nov. 15, 1904, leaving an estate valued at \$4,500 to be divided between petitioner and eight children.

## HELD TO DISTRICT COURT.

**John Littlefield Must Answer for Murderous Assault on Fellow Workman.**

John Littlefield will have to answer to the charge of assault with a deadly weapon in the district court. He was arraigned on the charge before Judge Murphy and waived preliminary examination and was bound over to the district court under \$500 bond in default of which he is confined in the county jail. Littlefield is the man who quarreled with a fellow workman for the Utah Construction company cutting him with a knife.

## DEATH CLAIMS MICHAEL ROGAN.

Michael Rogan, father of Daniel Rogan, the groceryman, William Rogan and Mrs. W. W. Davis, died yesterday at the home of his son, 2355 Monroe avenue, of a complication of affections, aged about 70 years. He has been a resident of Ogden for about 10 years, coming here from Nevada, where he lived for many years. The funeral services were conducted at the Catholic church. Deceased was a member of the A. O. U. W. lodge, and Southern Pacific Mutual Benefit association.

## ITALIAN DEPORTED.

Chief of Immigration Bureau McCabe of Salt Lake City passed through Ogden last evening enroute east to Philadelphia, with George Riva, who is to be deported to Italy, his native land. Riva came to Utah about a year ago last summer he was up Ogden canyon one evening and caused considerable excitement among the campers by firing a pistol and shouting, frightening the women, who notified the sheriff, and Deputy Schering and Wilson were summoned and placed the man under arrest. He was committed to the local hospital, where he has been confined until now.

## RAILROAD EMPLOYEE INJURED.

John Miller, an employee of the Rio Grande Western Railroad company, sustained painful injuries yesterday afternoon while assisting in unloading a car of lumber in the Union freight yards. He was lifting a heavy piece of timber from the car, when he overbalanced and fell to the ground, striking on his head. He was picked up by his fellow employees and taken to the hospital, where the company's physician attended him. No bones were broken, but the man suffered serious bruises, which will lay him up for a week.

## WILLIAM CRITCHLOW'S DEMISE.

William F. Critchlow, one of Ogden's best known and most highly respected residents, passed away at 8 o'clock this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. B. B. Brooks, 2635 Lincoln avenue, after an illness of six months. Mr. Critchlow suffered from a complication of ailments and had undergone six different operations in the hope of securing the desired relief. However, his strength finally failed him and death came at the hour indicated. Through all his suffering the patient never murmured, and bore up most cheerfully during his long struggle with affliction. He was senior president of the Seventy-sixth quorum of Seventy and at the time of his death occupied the position of city jailor.

Mr. Critchlow was born Feb. 8, 1839, in Pennsylvania. He joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints when a boy and came to Utah in 1862. In early days he taught school here and in other particulars was an earnest worker and good citizen. His wife

died three years ago. His surviving children were at his bedside when he passed away. They are as follows: Mrs. Hattie Jensen and John Q. Critchlow of Salt Lake City; Mrs. Joseph Stoeber, Mrs. B. B. Brooks, City Recorder W. J. Critchlow, and Charles, Joseph F. and Benjamin A. Critchlow, all of Ogden. He also leaves a number of grandchildren and other relatives. The funeral will be announced later.

## CHARGED WITH STEALING COAL.

M. H. Luckett, A. W. Hermann and James McDonald, who claim Denver as their home, were arrested about midnight last night and locked up at the police station charged with stealing a wagonload of coal. The men hired a team from a local livery and drove to the railroad tracks on Lower Twelfth street, where it is alleged, they took coal from a car belonging to the Oregon Short Line. They were in the act of unloading their cargo at the coal house of P. T. Smyth on Lincoln avenue when they were arrested. The men claim that they gathered the coal along the track.

The men were arraigned this morning on the charge of petit larceny, and placed under bail of \$100 each. The hearing of the case was continued without date.

## THOMAS W. LAWSON HAS "NO PERSONAL KNOWLEDGE."

Boston, Jan. 9.—In reply to a telegram from Atty.-Gen. Hadley asking him to give any testimony in his possession in regard to the Standard Oil company of Indiana and two other oil producing corporations, Thomas W. Lawson of this city tonight sent a lengthy telegram to Mr. Hadley. Mr. Lawson informs the attorney-general that he personally knew nothing of the relations between the Standard Oil company of Indiana, the Republic Oil company and the Waters-Pierce company, and that while he was aware of certain acts of the Standard Oil "monopoly," he could not "come within the wise restrictions" of Mr. Hadley's telegram.

"While I have no personal knowledge of these three things of which your telegram treats," continued Mr. Lawson, "I have sufficient general knowledge of the subject of your investigation to make it appear farcical to me that you, with the power of the great state of Missouri at your back, should want the testimony of any other person than the honest and reliable Standard Oil company, and their hirelings to prove any case in which the name 'Standard Oil' appears."

## SUPREME COURT TAKES UP SENATOR CLARK'S CASE.

Washington, Jan. 9.—The supreme court of the United States today heard argument in the case of the United States against the Bitter Root company of Montana, and at its conclusion took up the case against Senator William A. Clark.

In the Bitter Root case the prosecution is based on the allegation that the company, as the assignee of Marcus Daly, received the proceeds of a large quantity of timber cut on the public lands in Montana, while the charges in the Clark case is that Clark came into possession of about 11,000 acres of timber land fraudulently entered. The effort in the latter case is to have the entries canceled.

Mr. C. Burch and F. A. Maynard represented the government in the Bitter Root case, and Mr. Maynard in the Clark case. L. O. Evans appeared for the Bitter Root company and William Bickford and George F. Shelton for Senator Clark.

He gradually grew worse, however, and died Jan. 2, 1906, despite all that kind hands and loving hearts could do.

## NOTICE TO STOCK HOLDERS.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Jan. 10, 1906. A special meeting of the stockholders of the Bitter Root and Waters-Pierce companies is called to meet at No. 210 Deseret News Building, Salt Lake City, Utah, at 3 p. m. on Friday, the 2nd day of February, 1906, for the purpose of considering the articles of amendment of the articles of incorporation of this company as follows, to-wit:

Article 1. By changing the name of the company.

Article 2. By striking out the General Manager as one of the officers of the company, and by providing that the officers of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one person.

"The Board of Directors shall have power, without any action on the part of the stockholders, to make, alter, amend, or to the date of payment of any dividend, may provide by by-laws for the corporation."

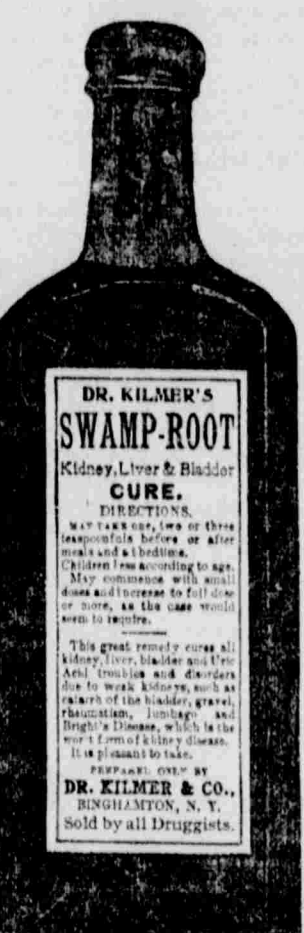
