BEAMS FROM BLUFF CITY.

Editor Deseret News:

There have been quite a number of damaging reports gone out about this country. Notwithstanding this we have got a good place and there is room for more Latter-day Saints to make themselves good, comfortable homes. The land is generally of the best quality, plenty of water (but it takes lots of labor to get it out) and as fine a climate as a person could wish for. There has scarcely been a day this winter but what a person could have worked outside if he had desired. Yet this has been the stormiest winter we have had since we arrived. Our greatest drawback is getting the water out upon the land. The ground is high and not much fall to the river and it is variable, first high, then low and full of quicksand, and when it is up it deposits sand in the ditch and, going down, leaves it to be shoveled out. When we came here we were all inexperienced, being used to mountain streams with lots of fall; consequently we made a great many mistakes and did a good deal of work that had to be thrown away. But now we have overcome most of the obstacles. We have discovered that we can make the water do its own work by having gates and as the river falls it will wash the sand out of the ditch.

There has been some talk of this mission breaking up, but that time I think is past. The crisis is over and there will be enough people stay to make it a success with the help of the Lord. If there are any of the Saints living in cold and disagreeable countries who want to get thawed out and make themselves good homes, now is their chance, for this country is like all newly settled places, and as soon as some people have a prospect of making comfortable homes they want to sell out and move to some other part. Those who come in can buy them out for half what it cost them and reap the benefit of their labors.

Our Sunday schools and meetings are well attended. The Relief, Primary, Y. M. and Y. L. Associations are in good running order and the people in general are striving to live their religion and establish a friendly feeling with the Lamanites, to gain their good will and confidence.

The DESERET NEWS has come duly to hand, with the exception of this

winter, when the road has been blocked and we have not received our mail until lately.
