IRRIGATORS MEET

State Engineer and Others at Work Harmonizing Various Water Users.

The Utah Arid Land reclamation commission met yesterday afternoon, with State Engineer Doremus, and the beard decided to proceed with the government on the basis of 69 second feet as a fair exchange for primary water rights. As to the South Jordan caval people, the board decided to pro-ceed without them, and will hold meet-ings at Payson and Spanish Fork to discuss the Strawberry-Duchesne water scheme. The commission will regard every existing irrigation association in the entire district affected as a unit from which to work. Then the different localities will be divided into groups and classified according to the varying iccal conditions. The state engineer expects to be en-

gaged for the greater part of the summer in harmonizing water users so as to get them to work with the gov-
