HOW SOME THOUSANDS OF EGGS WERE COOKED.

In the cargo of the Danish steamer Helmsdal, which came into port a month ago with a fire in her hold, were 250 boxes of eggs containing sixty dozen each. The water which was pumped into the vessel to quench the flames became heated in the process and boiled the eggs hard. It was suggested to W. H. Ellis, who was still available, that the eggs be sold for a profit to hotels and restaurants. When he set about refilling them, however, he discovered that the fumes of Swedish matches, the spontaneous combustion of which the fire on the Helmsdal was due, had impregnated the eggs with the odor of sulphur and that the entire lot of 15,000 eggs were unsalable. Not only were they unsalable, but they could not be given or thrown away. When he began dumping them in the sea, a Plunger, W. H. Ellis, of the Helmsdal, came to the rescue. He suggested that the eggs be sold for a profit to hotels and restaurants. When he set about refilling them, however, he discovered that the fumes of Swedish matches, the spontaneous combustion of which the fire on the Helmsdal was due, had impregnated the eggs with the odor of sulphur and that the entire lot of 15,000 eggs were unsalable. WOMEN WHO TELL THEIR AGE.

The common objection among woman-kind to letting their ages be known is not shared by the ladies of Japan, who actually display the facts as to their age in the arrangement of their hair. Girls from 9 to 15 wear their hair interlaced with red ribbons, forming a half-circle round the head; the forehead being left free with a curl at each side. From 15 to 20 the hair is dressed very high on the forehead, and put up at the back in the shape of a fan or butterfly, with interlacings of silver cord and a decoration of colored balls. Beyond 20 a woman wears her hair round a shell pin placed horizontally at the back of the head. Widows also designate themselves, and whether or not they desire to marry again. One may compare with this remarkable honesty the honesty of the Japanese a story told in one of the American papers of the reluctance of American women to adopt any such candid policy. A theatrical manager was producing a farce in which one of the characters was to be a bald woman, and it so happened that the actress who was cast for the part had no hair on the top of her head. But instead of availing herself of this natural advantage she wore a wig over the bare spot, and laid thereon some palpably false baldness—Pall Mall Gazette.
