Man crushed to Death Under the Engine.

NOT SUITS HIMSELF FATALI-

Elded. With a loss—\$10,000 interest on an \$800 Note—Forger to remain in Jail.

One hundred lady delegates are in attendance at the Idaho Equal Suffrage association convention at Boise this week.

Sgt. Major Karimoff was killed at Fort Bragg, Cal., Tuesday, by a log rolling upon him. The deceased was a native of Finland, aged 40. His home is in Finlant.

Ames, the twelve-year-old son of Mr. Daniels, a prominent farmer of Galaxy valley, Cal., was shot and himself Tuesday afternoon while playing with a revolver. He used two cartridges.

This is the second of the extraordinary Washington state cases of which were opened Tuesday. The first died for nothing, because they spent the \$200,000 available for the injured.

George Hodson, a farmer living near Palisade, Cal., and wife, met with a severe accident Tuesday morning. They were returning from the post office when their horse ran away. Both were thrown from the wagon, and Mr. Hodson was dragged a considerable distance before he was extricated. His condition is serious. Mrs. Hodson escaped with a few scratches.

Frank Hinkley (colored), a fireman, was over and hit by a fire engine at Los Angeles, Tuesday night. The engine was responding to an alarm, and Hinkley attempted to hold on to one of the partitions of the engine, but lost his balance and was thrown under the rear wheel, which passed over his chest, crushing his life out. He was about 45 years of age and had a well known character about town.

H. Clausen Putter has disgraced his mercantile relatives and shocked Tacoma, Wash., society by being locked up for drunk driving. His father and other relatives have been in a state of alarm. Caldwell, Idaho, Record, 20th. The Idaho Manufacturing and Colonization company, otherwise known as the Belvoir Corporation, is believed to be run by Horatio Campbell on Dec. 1, 1866. The sale is to occur on a judgment against the company secured by former president, Howard Belvoir, of this city, an amount of money advanced to the corporation, while he was general manager and director, which he calls the company's "notes." The amount of judgment is \$4,000 on which there is a fine \$1,000, plus interest and costs.
