

THE TART TEAM HAS SECOND PLACE

Samuelson and Williams Are Only One Lap Behind the Leaders.

WILLIAMS SETTING PACE TODAY

Gale is So Furious that Three Teams Are Compelled to Abandon Race.

New York, Dec. 10.—Owing to the furious pace which has been kept up during the night the Dussot-Mazan, Palmer-Agram and Downing-Limberg teams were compelled to abandon the contest on the last day of the six-day bicycle race today. The last two of these teams had dropped hopelessly in the rear last night and in the early morning leaving the track from time to time. It is not at all unlikely that the Keegan-Logan team will be forced to do so in a bad state.

The other riders merely kept up a steady fast pace and Turville and Mettling gradually dropped behind until they were lapped. This puts Turville and Mettling practically out of the race as they are now five laps behind the leaders. Root and Dorlan and Stiel and Williams were setting the pace early today.

At 2 p. m. today the Vandersteyt-Rogers and Root-Dorlan teams had covered 2,185 miles, 5 laps; the Samuelson-Williams team, 2,158 miles, 4 laps; the Gougots-Bretton, Keegan-Logan and Krebs and Folger teams 2,138 miles, 3 laps, and the Turville-Mettling team 2,118 miles, 2 laps.

The record for the 128 hours is 2,469 miles, 6 laps, made by Miller and Walter in 1899.

Russian Naval Agitator Arrested
St. Petersburg, Dec. 9.—Capt. Clado's campaign in the Novaya Zemlya expedition and in favor of sending out the Black Sea fleet, irrespective of treaty considerations, has gone to the length of only one criticism of the admiralty, but the Grand Duke Alexis, the high admiral, and resulted in his arrest. The captain is one of the witnesses detached from Admiral Rostovtzev's international commission which is to inquire into the North sea incident. He was arrested in the afternoon by direct order of Grand Duke Alexis. The fact of the arrest and a copy of the order were promptly published, for the purpose of showing the powers that Russia officially disapproved of the agitation.

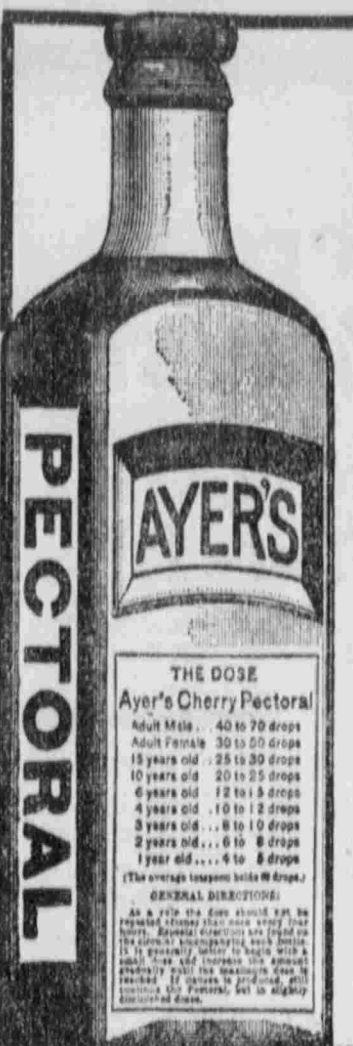

PREST, OF LETTER CARRIERS.

Must Show Cause Why He Should Not Be Removed.
Washington, Dec. 9.—The postoffice department has called on James K. Preston, president of the National Association of Letter-Carriers, to show cause within three days why he should not be removed from the service as a carrier in the Cleveland postoffice. The action follows a report received from the letter carrier to him by the department directing him to return to duty at once.

Defalcation Made Good.
San Francisco, Dec. 9.—Supt. Frank Leach of the San Francisco mint has made good the defalcation of former Cashier Walter M. Dimmick, by turning over his Oakland home to the surety company which was on Dimmick's bond for \$25,000. The company paid that amount to the government, and, as the law makes the superintendent responsible for the shortcomings of his subordinates, he has reimbursed the corporation.

TITUS DE BOBULA.

Acquitted of Charge of Voluntary Manslaughter.
Pittsburg, Dec. 9.—The jury in the case of Titus de Bobula, the young architect charged with voluntary manslaughter for the death of Mrs. Mary Stauffer, an aged woman who was run down and killed by an automobile operated by de Bobula on July 3 last, returned a verdict today acquitting him of the charge.

Building Trade Operations.

Chicago, Dec. 9.—In reviewing building operations in the 25 principal cities of the United States for the month of November, 1904, as compared with the same month in 1903, the Construction News tomorrow will say that there has been a total increase of about 25 per cent.

Irish Party to Meet.

London, Dec. 9.—John Redmond has called a meeting of the Irish Parliamentary party for Jan. 15 in Dublin to discuss the distress in the west of Ireland and consider means to "force the government to provide for the immediate necessities of the case, and put the law on its feet in Connaught and other poor districts."

Murdered Man Robbed.

Dallas, Tex., Dec. 9.—It happened today that when killed in Dallas last Monday night Charles Goldstein had on his person a watch, a ring, a diamond ring, valued at \$100.00. The dead man's body was found by a patrolman, and the watch, ring and diamond ring were found on his person.

England Won't Interfere.

London, Dec. 9.—In response to the appeal of the international arbitration society, Foreign Minister Lansdowne announced that the government is not aware of any circumstances that would justify them in modifying their previous decision not to interfere with the present Russo-Japanese war.

Diplomats' Salaries.

Washington, Dec. 9.—In the estimates for the diplomatic and consular service forwarded to Congress by Secy. Hay recommendations are made for increases in the salaries of a large number of officers in the service. It is recommended that the salary of the minister to Argentina be increased \$2,000; that of minister resident to Liberia, \$5,000; and that provision be made for a minister to Romania, and for a minister to Greece and Montenegro, and for a consular agent in Bulgaria.

MRS. CHADWICK'S SECURITIES

Said to Have Been Opened and Found Worthless.
Cleveland, Dec. 9.—According to a story published here today the package of securities belonging to Mrs. Chadwick and in the possession of Ira Reynolds, supposed to contain \$5,000,000 worth of collateral, was opened today. It is declared that while the face value of the securities was \$5,000,000, the actual value was not one cent.

It is also stated that this package was in a safe deposit vault in Jersey City until yesterday, when it was taken out and brought to this city by Ira Reynolds.

Ira Reynolds tonight said inasmuch as no one but himself had recently seen the securities which he holds for Mrs. Chadwick, the statement printed today that the securities are valueless is not authentic. Mr. Reynolds said:

"There is no possible means whereby any information in regard to the

genuineness of the securities that I hold of Mrs. Chadwick could have become known. You may say for me that any rumors in regard to their being worthless could not have arisen from any knowledge gained about them in the last few days. This is true for the reason that I have been jealously guarded against inspection by any one."

"How then could any information in regard to their character have become known?" Mr. Reynolds asked. "There is no authentic information," he said. "There can be none. I have not given the least hint about them."

"Is there any ground for the belief that the securities are worthless?" Only on the witness stand will I make known what they are. The case cannot be tried out of court. These securities were turned over to me as trustee, and I will say nothing about them except as trustee," was the banker's reply.

Regarding the attestation for \$5,000,000 which he is said to have made, Mr. Reynolds also declined to make a statement.

"The attestation involves too many other questions," he said, "and I may be able to enlighten the public about them just before the massacre to carry in the suit which Mr. Newton has brought against Mrs. Chadwick to recover the money that was lent."

SOLE CUSTER SURVIVOR.

Abraham McGee Arrested on Charge of Homicide.
New York, Dec. 10.—Abraham McGee, who claims to be the sole white survivor of Custer's command, in the famous battle of Little Big Horn, is under arrest here, charged with homicide.

Late Thursday night he got into an argument with Frank Mitchell, a salesman, over the proper method for cooking a kidney stew. A quarrel followed and the men attacked each other. McGee, who lived on the western frontier 40 years, declares Mitchell attacked him first, and he was run down and killed by an automobile operated by de Bobula on July 3 last, returned a verdict today acquitting him of the charge.

Mitchell did not appear badly off at the time, but he died 25 minutes later. McGee was arrested immediately in a newspaper office, where he had gone to set the editor right about the fight.

In telling the story of the battle McGee declared he was detached by Custer just before the massacre to carry a message to Maj. Reno, who was to have made a joint attack with Custer's troops on the Indians.

McGee bears the scars of many wounds which he claims to have received before he reached Reno's forces. Recently he came here from Texas and has been canvassing for a magazine.

FOR INSUBORDINATION.

Clerk Valentine of N. Y. Post-office Suspended for It.
New York, Dec. 10.—Waldo W. Valentine, a clerk in the money order department of the New York postoffice, has been suspended for insubordination. In consequence, the postmaster general, it is understood, will have a test case before him shortly, as the claim is made that Valentine refused to perform more than eight hours a day was the basis for his suspension and the preferring of charges against him.

Valentine, the postoffice official, does not come under the law which makes eight hours the day's work of a letter carrier. They hold that the clerks must work just so many hours as is necessary to clean up business.

Just now things are brisk at the postoffice owing to the beginning of the holiday rush, but Valentine refused to remain after 5 p. m., because of defective sight. He also claimed the law fixed his day at eight hours. Under civil service rules, he could not be discharged except under charges which had been proved.

Salt Lakers Invited to Listen to Free Lecture on Pauper Work.

GARDNER FOUND GUILTY.

Jury Concludes That He Illegally Sold Firewater to Indians.
Arguments in the case of the United States against John A. Gardner, under indictment for selling liquor to Indians on three counts, were concluded before Judge Marshall yesterday in the federal court at 4:30 o'clock. After an hour's deliberation the jury returned a verdict of guilty on the second count, and not guilty on the first and third. The count of which he was found guilty was for selling liquor to an Indian named Ungakup, on Feb. 19, 1904. The cases against him for selling liquor to Tabby Weep White in March, 1904, and to Wario, in February, 1905, were not proven to the satisfaction of the jury. Judge Marshall deferred sentence.

It is said by the Indian agents instrumental in pressing the cases against Hicks, Reynolds and Gardner, that until these indictments were secured the business of selling liquor to the Indians was extensively practiced along the "strip," and that the conviction of the men will no doubt have a very beneficial effect on the moral tone of the people residing on the strip, in their dealings with the red men.
