Nelson is Coming.

As announced in yesterday's telegraphic dispatch to the News, Mr. Nelson will arrive at Ogden Saturday evening. The Deputy United States Marshal of that city, Particulars of the arrest cannot yet be obtained, as the message to Deputy Evans simply contained the bare fact that Nelson had been apprehended in the course of his duties. This morning an officer started from Ogden with the prisoner and at some point in Idaho he will be met by Deputy Marshal Evans, who will return with him to this city. Reburial papers have been drafted and will be signed by the officers to whom he will be turned without putting the officers to that trouble and delay.

He Denies It.

The special dispatch that appeared in a local paper yesterday morning in relation to Prof. James H. Duncan, musical director of the Military academy, created considerable consternation among the friends of the professor in this city. The telegram contained the startling information that the men were in search of Duncan at Evanston with the firm intention of lynching him if found, he had been guilty of committing a serious crime on a youth of that place. When seen by the News, Prof. Duncan denied that the professor had really committed the accusations of the students. He was in search of Duncan at Evanston and said it was the work of an enemy. He had gone to that place to give a concert, but as two of his leading singers had failed to put an appearance on the stage, this enraged the bad element of the place and, as it was getting warm, he concluded to leave the place two days.

The friends of Prof. Duncan do not believe in the truth of the terrible stories charged against him and say that he will be able to explain matters to the satisfaction of the public. Therefore, Professor Duncan's character has been unslashed and he has stood high in social and musical circles in Ogden.

District Court.

In the Fourth District court yesterday an order was made approving the seconds of United States Marshal E. H. Parsons.

In the case of John C. Dowd vs. John Thorp the decree as recommended by the referee was granted.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

A Reduction in Assessment of Property Made in Provo.

The board of equalization of Utah county is in session yesterday and considered the assessed valuation of property in Provo city in comparison with other parts of the county. Investigation disclosed the fact that average assessment of residence property of the cities of Utah county was \$300 per acre, including business property in all the cities except Provo. In view of the great number of business property and the large percentage of business property was \$1000 inclusive.

The average assessment of farm property in the county was shown to be 10 per cent. in Provo.

Business property was as follows:

Business property (the ground), 25 per cent.

Residence property and farming land, 10 per cent.

The board meets again on Friday, when the assessments of other parts of the county will be considered.

Reduction of Taxes.

The County court has completed its session as a board of equalization. During its session the room in which the board met was crowded every day with prominent citizens, who came to see, but not to complain in a strict sense, but to get information. While the assessment of property generally has not been raised, it is necessary that property is worth nearly as much as it was last year, and in view of the general scarcity of money, it is difficult to understand why there is no increase in the property tax.

On Tuesday, the board of equalization met and decided that a reduction of 20 per cent would be equal to the general organization in values, and this was accordingly granted.
