

UTAH AND NATION ARE REPUBLICAN.

(Continued from page one.)

It was learned definitely that the scheme to remove the county seat to Park City had failed. The people here were naturally opposed to it from the first, and with the assistance of their neighbors on the outside they succeeded admirably. The expense attached to removing the county seat was a feature which militated against it, but more than anything else, for it was felt that it would place a burden upon the taxpayer which was wholly unnecessary at this time. For the present, therefore, the will of the people is that all county business be attended to from this point.

REPUBLICAN HEADQUARTERS.

News That Made the Committee Feel Very Good This Afternoon.

Advices received at Republican state headquarters today indicate that in Utah county the Republicans elected their representative, two county commissioners and county attorney. The vote for Howell was 652, King 643; McCarty 558; Young 635. For state senator, the Democratic nominee, received 694 votes as against 544 for McDonald's Republican nominee. This majority, however, is not enough to offset McDonald's majority in Carbon county, and in all likelihood he has been elected. For representative, Cotton, Republican, received 676 votes, and Johnson, Democrat, 690.

In Wasatch county the Republicans elected their entire ticket. King's vote was 625, and Howell's 594. For representative, James B. Wilson carried Wasatch by 255 majority.

In Boxelder county the vote on representatives was close, although the Republicans carried the main ticket by over 300 majority. It is believed that the Republican representative will win by 20 or 30 majority.

In Davis county the Republicans elected the entire ticket with the exception of recorder and possibly representative, although the latter is not yet certain.

In Fillmore, Millard county, Howell has a majority of 22. McCarty a majority of 42, and Watts for representative, a majority of 25. Onis gave the Democrats a majority of 12, McCarty 11, and Watts 7. This indicates that Millard county is Republican.

In Kane county Howell's majority was 154, McCarty's 142, and Lewis for state senator, 140. H. Scott Carter, Republican nominee for representative, has a majority of 160. The vote for Lewis indicates that he will represent the Eleventh district in the legislature. Howell's majority in Sevier county was 425, and McCarty's 525.

In Park City the Republicans elect E. P. Evans as representative with a majority of 101. The county ticket is principally Democratic the exceptions being two county commissioners, assessor and clerk. The balance is Republican.

The vote in Rich county gives McCarty 253, Young 248, Howell 235, and King 22. The Democrats have elected McDonald their representative with a majority of 3. John M. Baxter, Republican nominee, The Democrats have also elected two commissioners, recorder and clerk. The balance is Republican.

Massachusetts Strongly Republican. Boston, Nov. 5.—Lient-Gov. Ins. L. Bates of Boston was elected governor by the Republicans in the state election today defeating William A. Gaston, the Democratic candidate by 37,573 plurality, the vote being: Bates, Republican, 195,961; Gaston, Democrat, 158,382. The Republican plurality is the smallest since 1872.

The Republicans also elected the rest of the state ticket, and 10 out of 14 congressmen. The state legislature remains unchanged, the senate standing 31 Republicans, and nine Democrats, and the house 135 Republicans, 82 Democrats, and three Socialists.

Illinois Overwhelmingly Republican. Chicago, Nov. 5.—The Republicans have carried Illinois by a plurality of about 45,000. The Republican leaders claim that they have elected Buse for state treasurer by 47,000, and Manninger for clerk of the supreme court by 45,000. The Republicans will have at least 14 congressmen as against 11 in the last Congress. The Democrats are sure of nine congressmen and may secure two more. The contest in the Sixth congressional district is close and it may require the official count to determine the result.

The indications are that the Republicans have carried their entire Cook county ticket with the exception of Barrett for sheriff.

Chicago Returns. Chicago, Nov. 5.—With the exception of a few misleading precincts the total vote of the city of Chicago for state treasurer is as follows: Duddleston, (Dem.), 119,889; Buse's plurality, 12,471.

Barrett, the Democratic candidate for sheriff, received 125,825 against 123,594 for Healy, Republican, plurality of 12,231 for Barrett. For county treasurer, Hanberg (Rep.) received 119,482 against 115,696 for Klouhousa, Democrat, a plurality for Hanberg of 3,786. It is estimated that the vote for the county clerk will award the Republican vote by 5,000.

With 206 members the Republicans will have a majority of 26, with 208, a majority of 28.

President Leaves Oyster Bay. New York, Nov. 5.—President and Mrs. Roosevelt left Oyster Bay at 7 o'clock this morning and arrived at Long Island City in 50 minutes. The president took a train at Jersey City for Philadelphia. The president's country home at Oyster Bay will be closed through the winter.

The two youngest children, Archie and Quentin, will go to Washington today accompanied by the household. Mrs. Roosevelt will go to Philadelphia about noon to join the president, returning to Washington with him tonight.

New York, Nov. 5.—The train bearing President Roosevelt arrived here at 11:18. The president was met by the committee appointed for the purpose and was escorted to Masonic temple where he participated in the exercises attending the sesqui-centennial anniversary of the initiation of George Washington into the Masonic fraternity, which event took place in the lodge at Fredericksburg, Va., Nov. 4, 1752.

AFTER CHICKEN THIEVES.

Utah Poultry Association Offers Reward for Convictions.

At the regular meeting of the Utah Poultry Association held in January, 1902, it was decided that the association would give \$10 for the apprehension and conviction of any one caught stealing poultry in Salt Lake county. The offer was limited to this county because nearly all of the members of the association reside here. The association was organized at Ogden, Utah, in the year 1882, to obtain better poultry and more of it for Utah, and since that time a great deal of thoroughbred poultry has been imported into the state, and a marked increase in the quality of the dressed poultry on the market is to be noticed as a result. To make the catching of chicken thieves more effective the officers of the society earnestly solicit the support of the public and the raising of poultry in particular, and should any one wish to subscribe to the fund for catching poultry thieves, the money can be handed to Secretary D. Damon at Z. C. M. I. or to W. L. Price, treasurer, proprietor Miller & Co., and the money will be taken care of conscientiously and used for that special purpose.

AH QU HELD.

Chinese Woman Considered an Important Witness in Plum Alley Tragedy.

Habeas corpus proceedings were instituted in the district court yesterday afternoon to secure the release from custody of Ah Qu, whose correct name is Ah Qu, the Chinese woman who is being held by the police authorities pending developments in the case of the Chinese man, Yip Sin in Chinatown on last Saturday. The writ was issued and was returnable at 3 o'clock this afternoon before Judge Moran.

As set out in the writ that Ah Qu is unlawfully imprisoned in the city jail without any reason whatever; that she has not been charged with doing anything for which she could be restrained; and that her incarceration is directly contrary to the orders of Justice Dunn and witness to the billings of the

This morning Capt. Burbridge filed an affidavit in Justice Smith's court to the effect that the woman was an important witness to the billings of Wah Quong Tuo and asking that she be held as such. The justice ordered her committed to the custody of the sheriff in lieu of \$200 bail.

The case this afternoon was continued until 9:30 Friday morning.
