Matter of Disposing of City Refuse Elnally Settled-Number of Petitions For Street Improvements.

After deciding to use iron pipe intead of wooden stave pipe in the enlargement of the city's water mains the city council last night finally approved the contract with P. J. Moran and also his bond for the work and the improvement will be commenced without delay. For more than two weeks the council has been wrangling over the kind of pipe to be used and finally decided on the iron. An attempt was also made last night to lay the contract over until Thursday night to be considered with the other con-tracts for public improvements but it was deemed advisable to approve the contract so that no more time would be lost and the work could be completed by the middle of July and thus a water famine would be averi-ed. Moran was the lowest bidder on both kinds of pipe and his bid on the iron pipe, which was approved, was \$251,433.20. The amount of his bond is \$25,000 and the surety is the Utah Savings & Trust company. tempt was also made last night to lay

BAMBERGER GETS GARBAGE.

The matter of disposing of the city's garbage has finally been settled and only needs the approval of Mayor Thompson to the contract for it to be

only needs the approval of Mayor Thompson to the contract for it to be effective. The sanitary committee and Health Commissioner Stewart submit-ted two bids for handling the gar-bage last night. One was from the Salt Lake & Ogden Railway company, through Herman Bamberger, and the other was from the Salt Lake & Los Angeles Railroad company, through J. E. Langford. The Bamberger bid was the lowest and was accepted and the contract ordered approved. As Mayor Thompson was present when the committee considered the bids there is no question but that he will approve the contract and sign it. The contract provides that the com-pany shall haul the garbage at \$7.50 per car and dump if at some point along its road in Davis county. The city is to build a hopper at the load-ing station north of the Warm Springs but the company will build a sput track to it. The solary of the city's em-ploye at the hopper.
