Mr. Stephens emerged from his term in office as an advocate of a new form of city government, declaring that he had found the present system cumbersome and unwieldy. Mr. Badger has not yet given his opinion, but as a legislator is pledged under the Republican party's platform, to a univ system of correspondent for to a new system of government for Salt Lake.

Engineering Committee Asks Estimates-Kelsey May Get a Raise in Salary,

It is by no means improbable that this cty will be provided with a storm sewer system in the near future. The matter was considered by the street and engineering committee of the city council at its meeting last evening, and there developed no opposition to the plan. It is estimated that the system would cost in the neighborhood system would cost in the neighborhood of half a million dollars, and even that seemingly large expense would be justified, say members of the commit-tee, in view of the damage that is likely at any time to be sustained by reason of floods. The engineer was instructed to press the movement and make estimates of the cost as to cer-tain districts.

No restaurant proprietors or saloou No restaurant proprietors or saloon men appeared before the council license committee in opposition to the proposed ordinances abolishing booths, and ab-sence of persons interested was taken as an indication that they were indif-ferent as to what action the council wight take in the measure.

According to the provisions of a new garbage ordinance, which passed mus-ter with the sanitary committee, all business or commercial houses having more than 250 pounds of garbage in daily collection will have to dispose of it at their own expense. The finance committee, to which was referred Councilman Reedall's ordin-ance increasing the pay of the city en-

ance increasing the pay of the city en-gineer from \$2,400 to \$3,600, will report favorably on the proposition. Some members even favor \$5,000 per annum. Judge LeGrand Young wants to purchase from the city 200 acres of land owned by the city near the mouth of Emigration, and E. L. Burton of-fered to sell to the municipality land in City Creek canyon.

The slack can be saved by the manufacture of briquets which would eliminate the smoke nuis-ance. G.
