## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**A Son.**—This morning, at 9.40 o'clock, the worthy wife of Mr. Oscar H. Hardy presented her husband with a bouncing boy. The mother and child are doing well, and the father—well, he may possibly recover from his delight, but there are no symptoms of such an occurrence just at present. Our best wishes to all.

**Z. M. S.**—The members of Zion's Musical Society, including the orchestral and brass band departments, have been invited by Vice-President D. O. Calder, to join in an excursion to Spring Lake Pleasure grounds, (Calder's Farm), on Tuesday next. They are requested to call at his music warehouses and receive tickets, as soon as possible, so that the committee of arrangements may ascertain how many conveyances to provide.

**Killed by the Cars.**—A fatal accident occurred last Friday evening, on the Utah Southern Extension, at the mouth of the Sevier Cañon. A little seven-year-old son of section foreman Graham was playing on the track, as the tie train, which had just been loaded, was backing up to a water tank, previous to leaving for a point further south. The locomotive, No. 125, passed over the child's breast, from left to right, almost dividing the body. It was packed in ice, by order of Superintendent Sharp, and brought to this city Saturday night, where it was placed in a coffin, and on Sunday morning conveyed to Kayville, the former home of the parents, who accompanied the corpse, where it was buried after appropriate ceremonies.

**An Inquest was held in Leamington Precinct, Millard County, over the body previous to its leaving there, and a verdict rendered in accordance with the above facts.**

**Sanpete Coal.**—From Mr. C. L. Walther, the English gentleman mentioned some time ago as being interested in the Sanpete coal beds at Wake, in that county, and also the narrow gauge railroad from Nephi through Salt Creek Canyon to the mines, we learn that affairs are moving lively in the region he has just visited. The railroad grading (30 miles), as stated Saturday evening, is fast approaching completion, and will soon be ready for the ties and rails. It is designed to convey the Sanpete coal from the mines to the market. Our informant claims that this coal is superior to any yet found in Utah, and that besides its excellent qualities as a fuel, it is the only coal in the Territory from which coke can be manufactured. (Rather doubtful, however.) This is an important point in its favor, as now all the coke used in Utah is imported from Wales (Great Britain) and Pennsylvania, and the high price paid for it and the limited quantities to be obtained, no doubt constitute one of the reasons our smelters are so often idle. Mr. Walther intends leaving for Paris in a day or two, but may return to Utah shortly. Pleasant voyage.

**Burglars.**—House-breakers are becoming fearfully prevalent in this city just at present. Yesterday afternoon the residence of Mr. Fred Meyers, 11th Ward, was entered during the absence of the family, and several articles stolen, and an attempt was made to rob the house of Mr. William Grimsdell, in the 10th Ward, about the same time. The family were away on a visit, and a man was discovered by two young men crawling through a back window. Hearing them approach, the robber fled precipitately across lots and succeeded in escaping. People should be careful, nowadays, about leaving their houses unguarded. Our city is fast becoming "civilized," and life and property, as a consequence, are rendered more insecure than ever.

**As a special word of caution,** we warn people to leave guards in their houses on the night of the 5th of July, when the display of fireworks will not do attract many from home to witness the exhibition at the head of Main Street. Burglars know this, and will take advantage of it, rest assured.

**Sabbath Services.**—Yesterday afternoon, the Tabernacle was well filled, the congregation including quite a number of stranger visitors.

The first speaker was Elder Charles C. Rich, who discoursed mainly upon the duties of the Latter-day Saints. If we pretend to be the people of God, we must prove the truth of our calling by keeping his commandments. None could truthfully say they loved God, who did not keep his commandments, for that was the criterion by which our faith was tested. Fifty years ago it was predicted that this was the generation in which the Lord would come to reign upon the earth, and this people had been misadvised to prepare for his coming. Since that time, some things then spoken had been fulfilled, and we knew that all would eventually be fulfilled. The world did not accept this as true, but the Lord would act quite independent of what the world believed or said in relation to these matters. The speaker then gave historical instances of where the people of God had had works of preparation to perform. The first of these was the work of the prophet Enoch, who prepared himself and became so righteous that he was taken up from the earth. Abraham did the work allotted to him, as did Moses and others, and they had been rewarded for their fidelity and works of righteousness. They did what was required of them and we must do what is required of us. Ours was a work of great preparation, for we were, or ought to be, preparing for the coming of Christ. In order that we might do our duties faithfully before God, we must know what those duties were, and this we could not know unless it was revealed from heaven. There was a necessity for faithful study and continuous revelation from God. Why were the Saints building, and why had they ever built temples? Because God had commanded it. If he had not done so, the Saints would have known no more about such things and the purposes of their being built, than the outside world know today. If, besides the Saints, were building temples at this time, and who besides them knew anything of the object for which these temples were erected? We must have new revelation. Those of 1,000 years ago would not serve our purpose, wholly. We must know for ourselves, and merely suppose, concerning the things of God. It was no small work to prepare for eternity, and we had need of all the knowledge we could possibly acquire, to assist us in preparing for that which was to come. The speaker felt thankful for a personal knowledge that the Gospel had been revealed anew in our day, for the redemption of humanity. The kingdom predicted had been set up, and it would grow and increase until the kingdoms of this world became the kingdoms of our God and his Christ.

The next speaker was Elder Orson Pratt. The study of the gospel, to those who possessed the spirit of God as an interpreter, was calculated to greatly benefit and enlighten the understanding. This spirit was the spirit of revelation, and always had been, and would be, taken from the earth it was a great misfortune for the children of men. None, divested of that spirit, could be saved in the celestial kingdom of God. This, said the speaker, was a statement, in view of the fact that so many had died who did not believe in a present spirit of revelation. The speaker did not mean that such had gone to an endless hell to suffer for ever and ever, but that all who had been without that spirit of revelation on the earth had not been saved in the celestial kingdom. This did not imply that they were not saved. But there were diversities of glories and though they might have attained to some degree of glory, they had not attained the highest. The Savior said the obedient children of God should shine forth like the sun in the kingdom of heaven. Paul said there were degrees of glory, corresponding with the typical glories of the sun, moon and stars, and also that as each star differed from other stars in glory so should it be in the resurrection. The dead were not all to come forth to receive the same glory, but every soul would receive that to which it was justly entitled, no more and no less. The Father and the Son inhabited the celestial glory, the highest station in eternity, where was enjoyed a fulness of happiness, power, intelligence, light and truth, and they ruled over all inferior glories. Their glory was typical of the sun, and the gospel was the plan by which the children of God might return to the presence of their Father, the Savior, while on earth, said, "In my Father's house are many mansions. I go to prepare a place for you." The exact locality of this glorious region was not revealed. It may have been actually, but had not been in our day. Because it was said the Almighty inhabited the celestial kingdom, it must not be supposed that he was confined to that particular locality. He had power over all things, and was himself to any of the worlds of the universe. The velocity with which he did this must be something wonderful. Light traveled 136,000 miles in a second of time. We all thought this to be a marvellous speed, and he yet at this rate it would take 3 1/2 years to go to the nearest fixed star, and to some of the planets visible through the telescope it would require 600,000 years. We could not suppose, therefore, that the Almighty would be limited to any place, velocity as that of light. Nor must we suppose, as many do, that he required no time to travel from one point to another. No person could possibly be in two places at once, not even the person of our Father and Creator, and no intelligent being, who exercised his reason, could believe otherwise. It was often said that when a good man died his spirit had gone into the presence of God. This was true, but it did not mean that that spirit had gone to the celestial kingdom of God. It meant that the spirit had simply gone behind the veil, which if lifted would disclose the spirit world and the face of God, and he would there see all his works without veiling them, and would see the spirit and power were everywhere, but his person was not, and could not be in more than one place at one time. The speaker then showed how men were enlightened and enlightened, our faculties developed to their fullest extent and we would go into the celestial kingdom as creators, even as our Father, and assist him in the government of worlds throughout the endless ages of futurity. This destiny was for the faithful, for the Saints, and for all who would listen to the sound of the Gospel and live pure and upright lives while in this sphere of probation.

The choir sang the beautiful anthem, "Hosanna, Hosanna."
