

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

EARLY POTATOES.—Bro. James Bunting, of the 20th Ward, brought a very fine sample of early potatoes, of the English Ash-leaf Kidney variety, to the office this morning; they are enough to tempt the appetite of the most epicurean Irishman that ever dined on "praties and buttermilk."

NEW TRIAL.—The council for Brannagan and others, found guilty of the murder of Calvin T. Russel, filed a motion in arrest of judgment; the motion was argued and submitted to-day, but was not ruled on when we went to press.

TWENTIETH WARD CO-OPERATIVE STORE.—The Co-operative Store of this Ward commenced business on Saturday, the proceeds of the first day's sales footing up to a considerable sum. The management of the store has been entrusted to Bro. Charles Sansone, who has been raised to the business, and is well acquainted with all the minutiae of the Salt Lake retail trade, having been engaged in it solely for the last ten or twelve years. We sincerely wish the institution all the success it deserves, and from the feeling among the people of the Ward, have every reason to believe that it will "live long and prosper."

INTERESTING DISCOURSE.—In the 20th Ward, last evening, Elder David Candland delivered a very interesting discourse on the principle of Co-operation; showing the necessity of its introduction among the Saints, and the great changes it will accomplish in their midst. He was listened to with marked attention by the audience, and all present must have been convinced, or, converted to, the soundness of the views of the speaker.

ENCOURAGING.—Elder Samuel Pitchforth informs us by letter that present prospects for grain in Juab county are excellent.

MATTERS IN CACHE.—Bro. Wm. Shearman, of Logan, called in on Saturday. He reports that the people, generally, of Cache county, are entering into co-operation with much zest and heartiness. The grasshoppers were never so plentiful as now in Woodville, Logan and adjacent settlements, and the crops were nearly all destroyed in those localities. Peace and quietude were very general, no rowdyism or intoxication, and the people and priesthood were never more united than now in carrying out the counsels of the Presidency; in fact, so strong is this feeling that the Presidency has but to express a wish, in relation to any matter, to have it carried out. The measles were very prevalent in some settlements in Cache County, especially in Paradise.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—In the morning Elder Jesse W. Crosby occupied the time, detailing his experience while on his mission in the Southern States, from which he has just returned. In the afternoon an interesting discourse was delivered by Elder Orson Hyde; his remarks were reported.

SCHOOL FESTIVAL IN WEST JORDAN WARD.—Brother J. Edge Booth, of West Jordan ward, writes on the 23d instant an account of a school celebration, two days previously, among the children of the day and Sunday schools of the several branches of the West Jordan ward. About 275 children, a number of carriages with citizens and a company of cavalry marched in procession to the parade ground on the bench, where speeches were delivered by Brother I. Harrison and Bro. A. Gardner, after which football and other games were indulged in for awhile. The company then returned to the settlement for dinner. In the afternoon the school children had a picnic in the school-house in evening and until early the following morning, the children of a larger growth tired themselves with the same exercise.

ST. GEORGE.—We learn by letter from Bro. Joseph E. Johnson, of St. George, under date of the 16th inst., that the weather was becoming hot in that pleasant city, and the grasshoppers were still troublesome, though myriads had taken wing and departed. On the night of the 15th, two thieves, who had been incarcerated at St. George since last fall and had just been turned loose, left that region for the south, taking at least three borrowed horses, three ditto saddles, two ditto pistols and one ditto rifle, besides quite an amount of bedding. A man calling himself John Kinkaid, with several aliases, who has been living at St. George for the past six months, and who had been baptized during the period, went away with them. Bro. Johnson adds: "This hegira has caused a day's excitement, but there is no knowing what will become of the thieves."

It is to be hoped that these scoundrels will meet with condign punishment before they get entirely off, that their case may be a warning to others, especially the fellow who became a "Winter Mormon." But if he should get off with one-third of the above stolen property and has done no worse, St. George has got rid of him on tolerably cheap terms. Cases have occurred where villains of his stamp have succeeded in inveigling simple girls into marriage and deserted them and their offspring at the first convenient opportunity. We have heard it said that it is a maxim among some men to "think every man a rogue until you prove him to be an honest man." The practical application of this maxim in such cases would not be any wrong to strangers and would save the community trouble and expense in many ways.
