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## BREVITIES.

In New York a gigantic crystal palace is proposed.

The Ottawa News predicts that a Fenian invasion of Canada would be a short and bloody affair, the present temper of the Canadian people being such that no mercy could be expected.

### CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.  
 Petition to abolish National Banks, etc. Bills passed.

Morgan presented additional petitions asking Congress to abolish the National Banks and redeem the bonds deposited by them as security; to issue fifty millions in Treasury notes and make the same receivable in payment for custom duties and all other taxes collected by the Federal Government and to pay off the bonded debt.

The House concurrent resolution for adjournment sine die or to July Fourth, was discussed; a motion to lay it on the table having been rejected, it was discussed until the expiration of the morning hour, when it went over.

The calendar was proceeded with. Bills were passed to aid the construction of the Oregon branch of the Pacific Railroad; authorizing the Southern Minnesota Railroad to connect the line with the Northern Pacific for the relief of pre-emption settlers in Nebraska. A joint resolution to pay the widow of Gen. Rawlins a year's salary of a Secretary of War, was passed; also for the settlement of accounts of the disbursing officers of the army and navy; and the House bill to amend the bankrupt act in relation to its operation in the Territories.

The calendar was completed. Harlan moved to take up the bill for the sale of the Great and Little Osage Indian reservations and the removal of the Indians to the Indian Territory. The order of proceeding was the framing bill, but Harlan's motion prevailed, and pending the consideration of the bill the Senate went into executive session and soon adjourned.

### HOUSE.

New Mail Steamship Line.

Wells, from the committee on the decline of American commerce, reported a bill authorizing mail steamships on the service from New Orleans, monthly, to Lampico, Vera Cruz and Havana.

### NEW YORK.

A charge of irreverence—Rowdies to be indicted—Lecture for the public—Interrupting a lecture—Custom smuggling—Mortuary to retire—Charge against Grinnell—Tammany opposition—McFarland's case.

NEW YORK.—Rev. Chas. B. Smith, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, in Eleventh street, was tried, yesterday, by the First United Presbyterian Presbytery for bringing scandal on the church by inviting reporters to lunch and drinking gin and milk with him in a common restaurant on the Sabbath day. Smith admitted the charges and pleaded nervous exhaustion as an excuse for taking gin and milk. Drs. Harper and Armstrong made strong speeches against him.

In the court of Oyer and Terminer, yesterday, Judge Barnard charged the grand jury to indict the organized body of vagabonds, loafers and thieves infesting New York, known as prize fighters.

The new public park commissions decided upon a remarkable innovation. Hereafter the people are to have music on alternate afternoons at Battery, City Hall Park, Madison Square, Tompkins Square, Washington Square, Mount Morris Square and Central Park.

Miss Edith O'Gorman delivered a lecture on Catholicism at the Cooper Institute, last evening. Some persons in the audience endeavored to interrupt the speaker, but they were promptly removed by the police; after that all proceeded quietly.

The case, in which Charles L. Lawrence, a custom house officer, charged with having smuggled a large quantity of silk from Canada, was submitted to Commissioner Osborne, yesterday, for decision. It is stated that Hon. John Morrissey will soon resign his position as a member of Congress, on account of his ill health.

Hon. Edward Pierpont, U. S. District Attorney, left this city on Monday for Washington, to consult Gen. Grant in relation to his proposed resignation and the nomination of his successor.

The solicitors of the Treasury Department have been ordered to New York to investigate the charges made against Collector Grinnell by a large number of prominent business men. They are in session at the Fifth Avenue Hotel and are making a close investigation.

The Department of Public Parks has been organized by the election of Peter B. Sweeney as President.

The annual report of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions shows the probable debts this year to be close upon forty thousand dollars.

Sheriff O'Brien, Congressman Fox, Morrissey, Ben Wood, Smith and Ely, threaten to operate against the Tammany clique.

The New Jersey Hudson, New Jersey and Western Sussex Valley Railroad Company has been consolidated under the title of the New Jersey and Midland Railroad.

The first witness in the McFarland case, to-day, was Mrs. Sinclair, who testified to the poor circumstances of the McFarland family and that she once gave Mrs. McFarland fifty dollars, which was accepted, and at another time fifty, proffered in the name of A. Friend, which Mrs. McFarland declined, saying that she would obtain help from her father. Witness also went on to testify that she was here interrupted by a long discussion between the counsel as to the competency of certain questions. Julius H. Brown was next called.

### MISSOURI.

Widening streets—Coburn turned highwayman.

ST. LOUIS.—The full returns of the election, yesterday, gives Taylor, Democrat, for City Treasurer, three hundred and forty-seven majority.

The proposition to widen the approaches to the bridge was carried by a large majority; it authorizes the city to spend half a million dollars in widening the streets at the west end of the bridge, in order to afford facilities for the immense traffic which is expected to pass over the bridge.

A complaint has been made in the criminal court against Coburn, the pugilist, who robbed two men of seven hundred and twenty dollars last Friday night; the requisition is applied for J. F. Coburn, who will probably be brought here before Allen and Mace fight.

### ILLINOIS.

Henry Are at Commerce—Buildings fell

CHICAGO.—A fire yesterday destroyed the greater portion of the business part of Geneseo, Ill. Loss \$50,000; insurance six thousand.

The woolen buildings in course of erection on Randolph Street, fell, yesterday, with a tremendous crash, burying nine or ten workmen employed, in the ruins; they are all seriously, but none are thought to be fatally, injured.

### WASHINGTON.

Red Cloud may visit Washington.

WASHINGTON.—The Secretary of the Interior has indicated his readiness to receive Red Cloud, the Sioux chief and his warriors, who desire to come to Washington.

### OHIO.

Editors to fight a duel—Colored Grand Juryman—Pacific Railroad Companies to combine

COLUMBUS.—A despatch says it is rumored that the belligerent editors, McLean and Holsted, passed through here, with friends, on Monday evening, en route to Canada, to fight a duel. Jno. Jones, a prominent colored citizen, was drawn to act on the grand jury in the circuit court yesterday. This is the first instance of the kind in the State.

A Washington special says that a combination has been entered into between the friends of the various Southern Pacific Railroad lines and those of the Northern Pacific, for the purpose of getting both measures through Congress. The Southern men seem disposed to unite upon the Fremont route.

### LOUISIANA.

Fatal shooting—Fire.

NEW ORLEANS.—A case of shooting transpired last night, between John Farrel, a local reporter of the Picayune and ex-special police officer Smith; the latter was dangerously wounded, the former slightly. The ex-special officer will die. The cause of the difficulty was some animadversions published in the Picayune against the special metropolitan police for the publication, by Smith, of a scurrilous circular on Barret.

A fire last evening, which commenced in a saw mill in the rear of the harbor, extended to the lumber yard, and after wards to several vessels which were badly damaged.

### PENNSYLVANIA.

Cotton mill burned.

CHESTER.—The cotton mill of Brewster & McCree was burned yesterday; loss \$40,000, partly insured. It is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.
