LOCAL MARKETS

Butter is stronger than ever on the local market, the wholesale price having been strengthened to 34 cents. One cent higher, and the retail price jumps to 45 cents, so wholesalers say. Already, the high figure commanded by this article of 7000 has begun to bring in butter from Kansas and Nebraska, good Nebraska butter selling at 55 cents on market row, and a product of half butterine and half straight article is selling at 35 cents. It is believed that with home creamery butter at 45 cents retail, there will be great shipment of stock from the plains country east of the Rocky mountains, which will certainly prevent butter from going any higher. Local dealers say they are entirely irresponsible for the high price of butter. The reason they give is diminished feed products for the cows, producing record cards showing that the milk supply at present is not over one-half what it was in July. However, Indian summer is yet to come, which generally is attended by a temperary improvement in pasture conditions, and for a time an increase in the milk supply is looked for.

Commission men call attention to the urgent need of the extension of the pure food laws to cover grains. A flagrant instance of this was noted to-day, when a car of cats from Cache valley was unloaded. The cats, per se, were a fine article, but so mingled with them were cockerel, wild clover, mustard seeds and a regular assortment of dirt and waste from threshing, as to reduce the value of the shipment of dirt and waste from increasing, as to reduce the value of the shipment by 20 per cent.
