THEATRICAL.—Another House witnessed "Pauvrete" yesterday evening, which was given for the second time and for the Benefit of Madame Scheller. We were pleased to see our people attend the Theatre on this occasion. First, because it was the Benefit of Madame Scheller, a lady and actress who has won the esteem of all by her modest exemplary conduct while amongst us, whose pure and chaste style of acting is admired by all those who despise the vulgar and low, and second, because every one of our people should see this really beautiful play.
