

"miff." Since the war these are the only prominent points in Hancock's history. He paid a high compliment to Hancock as a soldier, but declared he is no statesman.

The Times says: A gentleman from Maine informs the Times' correspondent at Boston that the democratic greenback alliance in that State will certainly fall to pieces before the election. The Flatists object to the presidential electors by the Bourbons on the ground that they are hard money men and sympathize with the rebellion.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., 21.—The democratic State convention, after the temporary organization was effected, took recess until 2 p. m.

SAN FRANCISCO, 21.—A Portland dispatch mentions that there is trouble threatened between whites and Indians in Eastern Oregon and Washington owing to the encroachments of settlers in Camas Valley, from which the Indians have been accustomed to procure their annual supply of Camas Root. The Indians threaten to take forcible possession unless the whites leave.

WASHINGTON, 12.—The accumulation of coined silver in the treasury and sub-treasuries of the United States is so great that it is already very hard to find proper storage room for it. The vaults of the government now contain \$70,000,000 in silver coin, of which \$45,500,000 are dollars and the remainder in smaller pieces. The government also has on hand \$5,000,000 worth of silver bullion. This amount of coin takes up a great deal of room. The bulk of the load is carried in San Francisco and New York. Notice has been received from San Francisco that the overcrowded vaults will hold no more. It is impossible to induce people to hold and use this silver as currency. It returns to the treasury very soon after it has been paid out, in payment of duties or in exchange for silver certificates, a great many of which are in circulation, and still the work of coining the unpopular money goes steadily on, in compliance with the law at the rate of \$2,324,000 a month. This has been the average for 27 months. The total for these months being nearly 63 million dollars, three-quarters of which remain in the treasury.

The New York Tribune says: Utah now has more than the population fixed by law as the unit of representation in Congress, and could, therefore, but for one thing, make her claim clear for admission into the family of States. But her population might be ten times as great without bringing her a step nearer the Union than she is now. It is worth noticing that while the Mormon population has increased since 1870, 65 per cent., the non-Mormons have increased 200 per cent., a proof that civilization is fast gaining on barbarianism.

GALVESTON, 21.—Gen. Chambers, greenback nominee for Vice-President, announces his intention to withdraw, his health is not good, and he cannot canvass the State. He thinks that to continue in the race would do an injustice to his friends and add no strength to the party.

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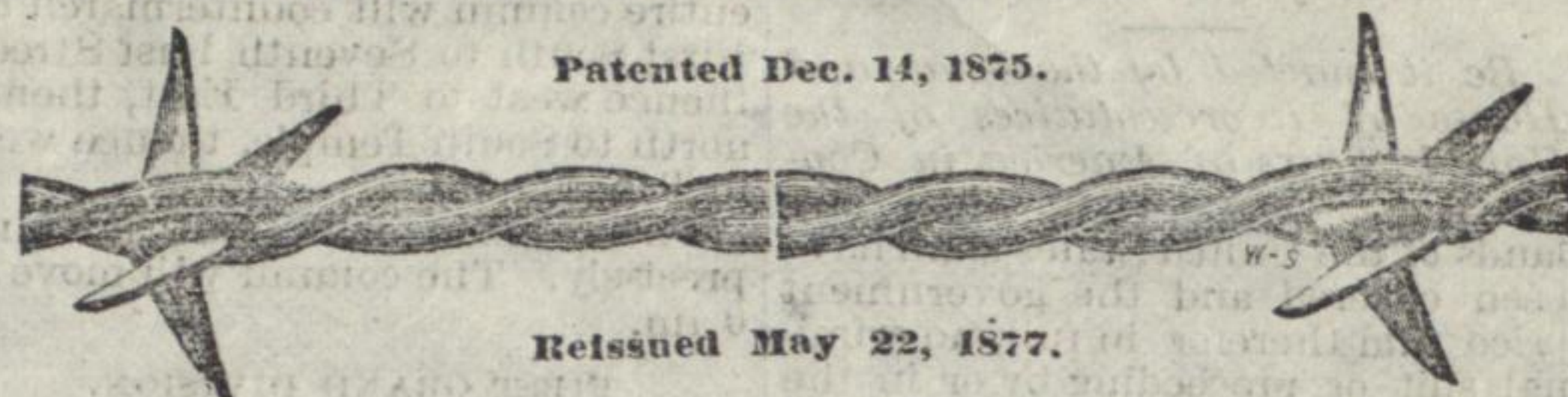
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
