THE STORM INCREASING. 7 p. m.—The storm is increasing and is absolutely usprecedented. All business has been paralyzed. At the Stock Exchange less than 15,000 shares were sold, the *mallest on record. The produce markets are all nominal. The steamers City of Berlin and La Champagne have arrived out. The weather has stopped the courts. Every streetar in New York, and the Brooklyn and Jersey City elevated trains are stopped. Brooklyn bridge and the ferries are almost abandoned. The down-town hotels are crammed with suburbanites. The elevated roads run 3000 trains daily usually, and were never before stopped. Westerners declare Dakota stopped.
