**Larceny of Beer Barrels.**  
NEW YORK, 8.—A case to which much importance is attached was brought to a successful close on Saturday night by detectives. For years the brewers of this city suffered serious losses by having the barrels stolen in large numbers.

They have spent thousands of dollars in a vain endeavor to discover the thieves. An extensive traffic in stolen kegs and barrels has long been carried on in this city, notwithstanding the law making it a penance to sell or buy beer barrels upon which the owner's name is stamped.
