LOCAL BRIEFS.

Greek Bound Over—Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith yesterday held George Roumeliotis, one of the Greeks who started a riot at Garfield, to the district court, bonds being fixed in the sum of \$500.

Fleed Fined \$25—Paul E. Fiebel, who was arrested on a charge of violating the license ordinance, by practicing palmistry and fortune telling without getting permission therefor, was fined \$25 by Judge C. B. Diehl.

Got 50 Days—C. A. Dailey, arrested by Special Agent Frank Hansen for stealing a suit case from the Rio Grande baggage room, was found guilty in the criminal division of the city court yesterday afternoon and was sentenced to serve 50 days in the city jail.

Appointment Confirmed—The county commissioners yesterday afternoon confirmed the appointment of C. D. Coates as deputy sheriff at Brigham to succeed Alva Williams, whose appointment as postmaster of that town has been submitted by Congressman Howell and who accordingly resigned as deputy sheriff.

Jeppson Discharged—Daniel Jeppson was before the criminal division of the city court yesterday afternoon on a charge of assault and battery on the person of his sister-in-law, Mrs. J. E. Jacobson. After a somewhat lengthy hearing, the defendant proved his innocence and was discharged. It was a case of a family quarrel.

Fighters Released—Charles Champe and Jacob Munz, two aged men who had been arrested for engaging in a neighborhood fight, were discharged by Judge C. B. Diehl yesterday afternoon. The court held that one of the men was undoubtedly guilty of assault and battery, but as the charge against the twin was for engaging in a pre-arranged fight, both would be discharged.

Condition Critical—Miss Anna Hall who was seriously injured at the residence of W. W. Chisholm, by falling on a wall bracket, while hanging curtains, is said to be in a critical condition. Paralysis in the lower limbs has resulted from the accident and her condition is generally unfavorable. The triangle-shaped instrument penetrated deeply into the young lady's back, and it was removed after much difficulty.

Carried a Gun—Oscar Booth, who has been herding sheep in Strawberry valley, but whose home is in Nephi, was fined \$10 yesterday afternoon in the criminal division of the city court, for carrying a deadly weapon and firing the same within the city limits. The man said he was on his way home, and had stopped over in Salt Lake. He had imbibed a little too much, and had not remembered just what happened afterwards. He was discharged on the charge of drunkenness, but had to pay for breaking the concealed weapon ordinance.

Wife Beater in Court—J. D. Murphy was sent to jail for three days for being drunk, at the afternoon session of Judge C. B. Diehl's court, yesterday. Another charge, that of wife beating, confronted the man, and he asked for the statutory time in which to plead to the complaint. His wife, who is alleged to be a most unmercifully last Saturday, was in court to testify against him. The frail little woman was haggard and worn and was but poorly clad. She works at the wash-tub to support herself and her large and lazy husband. When her earnings are not sufficient to satisfy him or when she will not give him the entire amount, neighbors say that he abuses her and often resorts to violence.

Newhouse and Insurance—Samuel Newhouse will leave for the east in the early part of July to attend a meeting of the international policyholders' committee of the New York Life and the Mutual Life Insurance companies, to be held July 9 in New York City. Mr. Newhouse was appointed to his appointment on the committee and asked to attend the meeting, in a telegram from the secretary, Seymour Eaton. The appointment was made by Samuel Undermyer, counsel for the committee. Among the men with whom Mr. Newhouse will be associated in the deliberations of the meeting are, Cardinal Gibbons, Judge Alton B. Parker, Gov. Pennypacker of Pennsylvania, Gov. Johnson of Minnesota, and many other distinguished men of the country.

ANNUAL REPORT OF STATE BOARD

Shows the Total Assessment of
Railroads and Other
Utilities.

COMPLETED FOR YEAR 1906.

It Amounts to \$24,951,308 as Against
\$23,533,905 for 1905, Making Increase of \$1,417,403.

The annual report of the state board of equalization has been completed for the year 1906 and shows that the total assessment of all railroad, telephone, telegraph and other public utilities in this state amounts to \$24,951,308. Last year the total assessment of such property was \$23,533,905, making an increase this year of \$1,417,403. The board reduced the assessment of less than the original assessment. Following are figures from the report and a recapitulation of the assessment according to counties:

PHYSIOLOGY IN SCHOOLS.

Nature Lesson at U. of U. Shows When and Why It Should be Taught.

At the university yesterday, it was stated in the nature class that the physiology of the grade schools should be given only in connection with the nature work. Some years ago, when the first nature book was written, the effects of alcohol and narcotics on the human system should be taught in the grades of the common schools, and a great deal of time was wasted in teaching these subjects. But the results were not satisfactory, because we should teach subjects that the child is ready for, and the youngest pupils know nothing of alcohol or alcohol.

THE HUMAN SKIN.

Compare the palm with the back of the hand, the skin on the former is much thicker, because work requires it so, and the harder one works with his hands, the thicker the skin on the palms become. So, too, the soles of the feet of dogs, the knees of cats, and of some species of apes and monkeys, and the heels and feet of men, all have similar toughened skins. Cows, pigs, and horses have hoofs—forms of hardened skin. Nature forms such a hardened covering when required by use, as on the backs of the hands of some hunters, and the corns on compeers. When the skin cracks or "chaps," the number of fine lines in the palm indicates the sensitiveness to touch, as at the tips of the fingers, where the nerves double to return. When we exert our fingers, or when the skin is covered with moisture—perspiration—and the body is quickly cooled, the skin contracts, and the average temperature, and rarely rises one degree from external heat, though the heat is sufficient to heat metals till they cannot be touched without blistering the skin. The skin is permeated in visiting Turkish baths. If the blood should rise even a few degrees, the condition of the health would become very serious. For if any of the nerves is removed, the nerves tingle with pain. The skin absorbs air, water, and nutrients applied for bruises, and it is the skin that protects the body from cold, and it is the skin that protects the body from heat. The skin is composed of a layer of scales, the outermost of which is the true skin in which the hairs are embedded—while between the two layers is a thin layer of pigment, giving to people their characteristic complexion.

The work done by the skin shows that frequent bathing is essential, not only for cleanliness, but also for health. But the daily bath is not required by all, much less the cold bath. When the hygienic principles follow from the scientific knowledge of the pupils, the laws of health are easily understood and more readily observed.

HOW TO BREAK UP A COLD.

It may be a surprise to many to learn that a severe cold can be completely broken up in one or two days' time. To do this, however, prompt action is necessary. The first symptom of a cold is a dry, tickling cough, a profuse watery discharge from the nose, and a thin, watery coating on the tongue.
