During the fire at the Camden station, last night, Governor Car-roll sent a dispatch to President Hayes, stating that the depot had been fired by a mob beyond con-trol of his forces, and asking that assistance might be afforded by the United States authorities. This morning, a telegram, addressed to Gen. Barry, commanding at Fort MicHenry, was received through the signal office, by Gov. Carroli, from the Secretary of War, in an-swer to his application to the Presi-dent for troops, which read as fol-lows:

"The Secretary of War directs you (Gen. Barry) to report to the Governor of Maryland, with guns, and all of your men, to act accord-ing to his orders."

The message was sent, as receiv-ed, to Fort McHenry, by a mount-ed orderly, who returned with word that the troops are in readiness at a moment's notice.
