ARIZONA AFFAIRS.

President Andrew Kimball Talks of Conditions There.

President Andrew Kimball of St. Joseph State of Zion in the upper Gila valley, Arizona, is in the city. He reports the most encouraging prosperity not only of the state in that part of the country, but of the general community as well. As an instance of the productivity of the soil, President Kimball mentions one sweet potato which tipped the beam at 3 1/2 pounds and from which a family of eight people subsisted for two days. It is nothing unusual to raise a crop of grain and a crop of corn from the same ground in one year, and tree trimmings will keep a man in firewood the year round. Five and six crops of alfalfa are cut from the same ground in the course of a year, each cutting yielding 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 tons per acre, and the grover's average is \$50 per ton on good shape, and by the price will be \$15. There is hardly any winter or spring, there are copious rains in July, August and September, and people are now cutting their fall grain.

The St. Joseph Saints have one of the best academies in Arizona, and many of the people of this district are sending their children to school there. The state is also maintaining a missionary class of 25 members who are preparing themselves to give missions into foreign countries. The local militia or National Guard are doing their drilling on the academy campus, and the army is in the academy building.

The health of the people is remarkably good, and though suffering from the drought are still hopeful for the future. The St. Joseph Saints are building several new meeting houses, including one at Thatcher to cost \$7,000 and one at Layton to cost \$5,000, while a third is building at Clifton to cost \$10,000. The St. Joseph Saints are maintaining cordial relations with the Saints. The county supervisors have given \$300 worth of land and a mining company there to give \$300 for missionary purposes at Clifton. Attacks have been made on the Saints by missionaries of other denominations, but President Kimball and his staff are thoroughly organized and there is united action in all the works of the church.
