

The Labor Trial Meeting.

The Labor Trial meeting last night was largely attended and enthusiastic speech making and demonstration were the order. In the matter of organization and absence of public officials there was an effort to make the gathering a sort of Rep.-Dem. Union, also. Major General Suston and Senator W. H. Brewster were present, and Governor C. C. Connelly. The first man to speak his little piece was "General" Madsen, who read a resolution which was adopted to protest that the City Council was so slow in getting into action in settling wages of building mechanics \$2.50-\$2.75 per day, and in providing water for the city. This action was taken by the Council, he said, but it was not enough. Then a resolution was adopted, asking that the Council change its course with reference to ameliorating the sewer. That was all that could be done at this time, but the next meeting will be held Saturday evening at the Hotel Roosevelt, Ogden, Mrs. Madsen, spoke in the same sense. A motion was carried immediately to the effect that they visit the Chamber of Commerce Saturday evening and demand their demands to have the necessary resolutions adopted in the meetings of Hotel, Bayes, Williams, Hinckley and Riley.

Military Matters at Morgan.

General Morgan has returned from Morgan, where he organized Company 4 of the Utah National Guard. The company has a membership of 45 men. The other companies are Captain W. W. Wadsworth, First Lieutenant, M. J. Harrington; second lieutenant, Fred R. White.

In Morgan as elsewhere in the Territory, the military spirit has taken possession of the young men and they are greatly pleased with their organization.

Snowflake Stake Conference.

At 10 a.m. of May 25, 1894, in the Stake house, at this place, the regular quarterly conference of the Snowflake Stake of Zion can begin, and was opened in order by President of Stake, James N. Smith. Joseph of the Stake presidency was present, the majority of the High Council, Bishops of the various wards, with a number of visiting Bishops from St. George Stake, and a very goodly number of the saints from the adjacent stakes.

The conference continued in session during Sunday and Monday, May 25th and 26th, holding two regular meetings each day, besides a very interesting and instructive Patriarchal meeting held in the evening of the 26th.

The speakers were the Stake presider, Elders J. N. Smith, G. H. Hunt, and J. H. Richards; Parishes Paul Smith, Elders Chase, Smiley, J. W. Smith, and A. J. Huntington; Elder C. F. French; Dr. John Jarvis, General endowment and Tabernacle; General endowment and Tabernacle property was reported in private to Richards. General and local Church authorities unanimously sustained by the use of their influence, the fact of taxes being apportioned to the temporal interests of the people, while such, it is believed, will prove of great benefit to the saints.

The following is extracted from a private letter from Elder Angus K. Nicholson, written at Bay St. Louis, Mississippi, June 11, 1894:

"Last Sunday my companion Elder Alexander L. Smith, serving at the house of Mr. John Berlin, a very staunch and amiable friend, residing in the vicinity of Bay St. Louis. A large crowd of people gathered at the place of meeting. I addressed the people first, dwelling upon the theme of the necessity of present revelation and the functions of the Holy Spirit. Elder Nicholson followed their example, especially in the matter of personal salvation, and the importance of the individual's interest. The spirit, God's word, was poured out in strength upon the people, and after the service, Mr. and Mrs. Berlin and a white lady—Mrs. Wimber—again addressed the congregation.

"On the arrival home of a very fine, and beautiful river, whose name is the name of the sacred stream where Jesus was baptized, a group of about fifty persons assembled. These men of the school age, residing on the banks of Little Creek, Bayou, I then addressed them for a short time upon the nature and character of our religion of baptism. The water had been filled up by the waves of the sea, so that the water was only three or four inches deep. I then addressed them, and the three day meeting, like the whale and Jonah, ended with the Lord's intercession which ushered in the flood of divine outpouring.

"The onward march of the saints continues. Angels of the Highest heavens of purity and unselfishness are continually appearing. It is now and certain we say that Missions are the best, and among the Mormons.
