LOCAL BRIEFS.

Newspaper Changes.—Malcolm McAllister has resigned his position as circulation manager of the Republican, to take effect Aug. 1. George Hale has been promoted to be business manager.

State Street Deal.—The 67 by 185 foot lot south of the Whitehall on State street, has just been sold by the State Realty company to L. E. and L. C. Riter, for \$20,520. The lot will be built on later.

Commissioner Appointed.—Judge C. W. Morse has appointed Peter Van Valkenberg of Sanday as a commissioner to measure and divide the water of Big Cottonwood creek. The appointment was made in pursuance of a decision lately rendered in the suit of the Progress company against the municipality of Salt Lake, and others.

Infected Dairy Cows.—Six cows belonging to a dairy near this city have just been examined, showing that three of the animals have tuberculosis. A state inspection law is called for. The bureau of animal industry will supply free quantities of tuberculin by which cows may be tested for tuberculosis.

Salt Lake Chorus Enters.—At last night's meeting of the Cambrian society, it was announced that five choruses of 125 voices each had been secured for the fourth national Eldestad to be held in this city, in October next. One of these choruses will be organized by Prof. McClellan, assisted by Fred C. Graham.

Nauvoo Legion.—Members of the Nauvoo legion will meet for a regular monthly session Friday evening, July 17, commencing at 8 o'clock, at headquarters in the presiding bishop's office. All interested are requested to be present, as business of importance is to be transacted, including the preparation of programs for the remainder of the season.

His conclusions are that the value of real estate property is being sold for 25 to 40 per cent below its actual value, his conclusions being based on Pacific coast values. In Seattle business center realty is bringing \$5,000 per front foot.

BUMPY ROADS TO BE ATTACKED

County Officials from Salt Lake, Davis and Weber Hold Council of War.

INSPECTION OF HIGHWAYS

Thoroughfares to Be Divided Into Sections and Duty Patrolled for Bad Spots Between City and Ogden.

County officials from Salt Lake, Weber and Davis counties, met at Lagoon yesterday afternoon with members of the Weber county Good Roads association, and the Salt Lake Automobile club. The meeting was one intended to bring about definite results in getting the Ogden-Salt Lake road repaired, and all of the talking led directly to this problem.

Those present from Davis county were M. H. Randall, John Walsh and C. A. Fernelius, county commissioners; H. J. Sherrill, chairman of the Commercial club, and John G. M. Barnes of Kaysville; Rufus Adams of Layton; A. L. Clark, mayor of Farmington; J. H. Robinson and John H. White and D. P. Felt of Farmington.

From Weber county Joseph Peery was present, and from Salt Lake, O. H. Hewlett and W. E. Macartoon. John S. White of Farmington was elected a member of the proposed road commission for Davis county. O. J. Stillwell was appointed from Weber, and Mr. Macartoon was named from Salt Lake.

It was decided to divide the highway into sections, each under the charge of an inspector whose duty it would be to report on its needed improvements. The mayor of Salt Lake and the mayor of Ogden each agreed to name another commissioner, and Monday this group of men will meet to apportion to each member the work to be done. Friday night in Salt Lake a meeting will be held with the county commissioners and city officials, and a tour will be taken over the Salt Lake and Ogden road.

AFTER SEVENTY YEARS.

Claudius V. Spencer Receives Invitation to Attend 75th Anniversary.

From his old home at West Stockbridge, a village of Massachusetts, Claudius V. Spencer has received an invitation to return to the seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of the West Tennessean, which was founded 75 years since Mr. Spencer left Stockbridge in company with his father, Daniel, to seek a new home in the West. MAY MODIFY ORDER.

Chief Pitt Sees a Great Light in Cigar Stand Closing Edict.

The order issued by Chief of Police Pitt that cigar stands in front of saloons must be closed on Sundays as well as the saloons, is to be modified. Twenty-one owners of such places refused absolutely to sign the order. As a result of the refusal to sign by Chief Pitt and as a result of such refusal their licenses were held up when they were sent to the council without the approval of the chief of police. Yesterday afternoon Mayor Bransford had a talk with Chief Pitt and Councilman Stewart of the police committee, and he declared that the order must be modified as he did not propose to hold with the county commissioners, and that the saloons that had cigar stands should be permitted to keep open on Sunday and have the same chance to do business as the regular saloons. As a result of the meeting the saloon keepers will probably be notified in a day or two that the order has been modified.

MAYOR DECLINES TO SIGN.

Is of Opinion That Black's Gravel Resolution is Too Restrictive.

Mayor Bransford has not signed the resolution passed by the city council Monday to the effect that no more gravel or dirt should be dumped upon the streets, where such action would raise the level above the prescribed grade. The resolution was introduced by Councilman Black, and was for the purpose of putting a stop to the practice of road supervisors filling up streets to an unlawful grade. The resolution afterwards, in many instances, to not only remove the same but to go much lower in order to strike the proper grade. The resolution was notified to the city engineer, who in the way of filling up chukholes, etc., with the consent of the council, but Mr. Bransford is of the opinion that the resolution is too restrictive in character.
