LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

QUARTERLY CONFERENCE.

Bishop's Meeting. - Bishop's meeting at seven o'clock to-night, at the Council House.

At Calder's. - The 20th Ward Sunday School and friends are at Calder's farm to-day.

New Office. - The new Junction printing office, being erected by Mr. Richard Ballantyne, in Ogden, is advancing rapidly.

Benefit Entertainment. - This evening there will be a concert in the 5th Ward Assembly rooms, for the benefit of the fund to aid the poor among the Welsh saints to emigrate. It will be a choice entertainment. Admission only 25 cents.

Dr. Vollum. - Dr. Vollum, formerly post surgeon at Camp Douglas, has now charge of the department of physical examination at West Point Military Academy. The Doctor was greatly respected in this community.

Wool. - The Territorial Enquirer asserts that from the 1st to the 20th of June, Provo factory purchased 150,000 pounds of wool, much of which was derived from West Jordan, in this county, and from Tooele County.

Fireman. - The members of Watson Engine Co. No. 3 are requested to attend a special meeting, on Friday evening, at 7:30 o'clock. By order of FRANK MAY, Foreman.

Next. - The next of the series of match games between the Red Stocking and Deesert clubs will be played on Saturday afternoon. If the first named club gets it the championship is decided in their favor.

Be Careful. - We have been informed that, in some instances, persons in charge of children's pleasure parties from this city, to take pleasure grounds, have not been quite as careful as they should in having a sufficient number of grown people in some of the row boats with the younger folks. A timely caution on this point may be the means of preventing accidents.

Grasshopper Devastations. - We learn from Brother Samuel Fletcher, of Coalville, that the grasshoppers in that vicinity are clearing off every green thing they come in contact with. The pests are in great swarms and are sweeping away whole fields of grain and other crops, leaving the surface of the land as bare as a traveled road. The Chalk Creek field, which comprises most of the Coalville farming land, has been almost wholly devastated of both grain and hay. The field to the north of the town is being sown to the same manner.

Business at Coalville is exceedingly dull, about the only thing in the shape of trading that is going on is the hauling, by a few teams, of coal to Park City and Salt Lake City.

Tooele City. - A correspondent writes from Tooele City, June 25th: "The health of the people is good. We have not had much disease of any kind since last winter. The crops look promising and, to all appearance, give promise of a beautiful harvest, although some of the dry farmers are complaining of the dry weather. The grasshoppers have put in an appearance in patches, and are on some of the lucern and clover. In some of our gardens the worms are making a clean sweep of the young carrots and potato vines."

Co-operative store has been doing a lucrative business of late. The price of goods has been greatly reduced, so that it secures a good deal of the trade that used to pass. The co-operative store and shop is doing a thriving business, having a good many men employed and a few apprentices. Our county co-operative store, which is beginning to have a beneficial effect. The sheep and stock raisers are to all appearance, doing well. "Our day schools have not been so good as in times past, owing to the lack of means. The Sunday school is in a flourishing condition. The Young Men's and Young Ladies' Societies are exerting a good influence."

President F. M. Lyman and Bishop N. B. Tuttle have shown, both by precept and example, that they are looking to the benefit of the Saints. The feeling of the people is good, all seeming to do their best for the work."

A Lamentable Case. - It will be observed, by ordinary notice in another column, that a little son of Mr. John C. Graham died last evening. The cause of the demise of the bright little fellow was malignant or cancerous tumor in the region of the right eye. The malady was first observed nearly a year since, the indications gradually becoming worse, until the eye behind which the tumor was forming appeared greatly distended, and protruded as if being pushed out of the socket. About three months since Dr. Anderson, assisted by Dr. Richards, performed an operation upon the patient, cutting out the tumor, going as close to the brain as possible without immediately endangering the child's life. As a matter of course the eye had to be taken out at the same time as the tumor. The operation was performed with exquisite skill, yet the surgeons could give no assurance of recovery. The step, taken, however, was the only one that seemed to afford any shadow of hope. About four weeks subsequently the tumor recommenced forming, continuing to increase in size, until death relieved the little sufferer.

Many of the leading surgeons of the Territory examined the patient and pronounced the case beyond the reach of human skill. Everything that could be done for the child was done. During the whole time of his illness, his anxious and loving mother watched him and waited upon him unceasingly by day and night. In fact he would allow no other person to nurse him. Much sympathy has been manifested for her as well as the patient, in the trying ordeal. We unite in sympathy for the parents and other relatives of the child, who was an exceedingly bright, promising and intelligent boy.

The Martyrdom. - On the 27th of June, 1844, thirty-four years ago to-day, a mob of about 150 men, with blackened faces, surrounded the jail at Carthage, Hancock Co., Illinois, in which Joseph Smith, the Prophet, and Hyrum Smith, his brother, the Patriarch of the Church, were confined, and murdered them in cold blood. President John Taylor, who was also in the prison at the same time was pierced by four bullets, the late President Willard Richards escaping uninjured.

Those two great and good men sealed their testimony with their blood, but their works live after them, and the time will come when Joseph will be acknowledged as one of the greatest prophets ever chosen by the Almighty as a medium of imparting a knowledge of the principles of life to fallen humanity.

Arrival of Missionaries. - The following is from the *Millennial Star* of June 10th: "The S. S. Montano arrived after rather a stormy passage on the 7th inst., at eight a.m., the following brethren were on board - J. B. Bunting, Wm. G. Saunders, James Rees, J. E. Hyde, F. G. Prosser, J. Theodor, F. L. W. Fuhrmeister, and Gottlieb Kne. The last four left at 11 a.m. for the Swiss and German mission, expecting to meet President H. P. Cannon at Rotterdam, where they will be with them emigrating by steamer of June 15th.

Brother J. E. H. was in poor health, but he was taken in charge by his relatives, and it is hoped will soon recuperate. The rest of the company are first rate.

Sister J. Ferguson and Sister A. Laker were both well, and have already been received by their friends; brothers Bunting and Saunders will also visit prior to being assigned."

Milton Ward. - To-day we met with Bishop Eli Whittier, of Milton, Morgan County. The crops there are unexceptionably fine; but Forterville, adjacent to it, has not been so fortunate. At the latter place, early in the season, the crops, while tender, were devoured by the "hoppers." Since then, however, the grain has come up again, looks tolerably well, and there is even yet a prospect of a crop.

Milton has a most excellent Sunday school, under the superintendency of Brother Charles Tucker.

Fifteenth Ward. - The 15th Ward Y. M. M. I. A. are still holding their weekly meetings, and intend doing so all the summer.

Last Tuesday evening Brother Jas. H. Moyle, one of the members delivered a most interesting and instructive lecture upon physiology. All present expressed themselves highly gratified and well paid for attending; in fact, those who attend regularly, consider that it pays all the time to continue the meetings.

Holiday Excursions. - We understand that Fourth of July trains will run to this city from Cache Valley in the north and York in the south and all intermediate points at reduced rates, to enable people from the country to be present at the grand concert at the Tabernacle, on the national holiday. It will probably be one of the finest musical feasts ever enjoyed in Utah.

The Concert. - The benefit concert tendered to the Scappatura family, last night, in the Social Hall, was patronized by a respectable and attentive audience. The performance was good throughout, nothing occurring to mar the proceedings nor lessen the enjoyment of the occasion. All who attended, we will venture to say, went away well satisfied with the entertainment.

Band Ridge Wharf. - What the Band Ridge dry farm is looking well, especially that which was sown in the fall. The spring grain is not quite so thrifty. All of it, however, stands in need of a good rain shower.

The Fourth. - The Fourth will be celebrated with considerable spirit at Ogden. The friends of that city will have their doing at Farr's Grove, while the Tenth Ward Band, of this city, will go to Jones' Grove.

Spectacles. - The party who lost a pair of glasses can get the same at this office.

The Frigid North. - Captain Tuttle, the veteran Arctic explorer, will lecture at the Fourteenth Ward Assembly Rooms to-night.
