Emigration Agent.—Elder William C. Staines purposes leaving this city on or about the 9th of March, for New York, for the purpose of transacting business connected with the coming season's emigration. Those desiring to transact business with him should communicate with him by letter or personally at once, or at least before the date of his leaving for New York.

His address in the east will be the same as heretofore—P. O. Box 3957, New York.

We may mention, incidentally, that the fare from New York to Ogden last year was, for passengers twelve years old and upwards, \$31.00, with 100 pounds of luggage free; children from five to twelve years \$25.50, with fifty pounds of luggage free. Extra luggage had to be paid for at the rate of \$3.00 per 100 pounds.

The fare from Chicago; \$41.00. Extra luggage \$3.50 per 100 pounds.

Fare from Omaha; \$33.00. Extra luggage \$3.50 per 100 pounds.

It is expected that the rates for the coming season will not differ much from the above.

We extract from Elder Staines' circular of last year:

"In order to secure passage you will have to pay in advance. Send your money to procure your tickets for passage and extra luggage, by Post Office Order, or Draft on New York, payable to Wm. C. Staines, P. M., and your tickets will be forwarded in time, with instructions when and where to join the Company. You must be very particular about stating the exact weight of your luggage, as all over the amount not entered on your ticket will be charged for by the Railroad Company."

"You can go at any time after you receive your tickets."

"It will take about nine days to go from New York to Salt Lake City, and you must have means to purchase provisions for that time."

"All funds raised in Utah for emigration purposes are forwarded to England to be used there."

City Council Proceedings.—The City Council met last evening, Mayor Wells presiding.

A remonstrance, signed by Jesse West and others, was read. It protested against the granting of the petition of E. Runkton and others, asking that 5th West Street, between North Temple and 9th South Street, be opened. The protestants, some of whom were present, set forth that 5th West Street was situated on very low ground and its opening would leave the embankments of the canal liable to be trodden down by cattle, which would lead the water out and flood the adjacent fields, and that even as it was it was next to impossible to keep the water back. Furthermore they stated that it would cost the city from \$20,000 to \$30,000 to open the street.

Mr. Runkton, who was also present, represented on the other hand, that the county was interested in the opening of the street, and he appeared in behalf of the county as well as himself and others. The county proposed bearing the expense, as it was designed, if the petition were granted, to open a road that way to Cottonwood. Another advantage that would accrue from the opening of the street was that a large number of citizens would be brought, so far as travel was concerned, from one and a half to two miles nearer to Agricultural Park.

The matter was referred to the committee on streets and alleys,

who, accompanied by the Mayor, purpose paying a personal visit to the locality in question.

A communication was received from W. B. Hibbard, Supt. of the W. U. Tel. Company, which referred to the petition of himself and A. M. Musser, asking for the repeal of the law relating to special license of telegraph companies. He stated that Montana had lately abolished the special license law, and that Salt Lake and Ploche were therefore now the only places where such licenses were required.

Petition of B. F. Raybould and others, asking that a water tank be constructed at the corner of 5th South and West Temple Streets, where there is a natural spring, for fire purposes, was referred to the committee on fire department.

Petition of Morris & Evans for the right to quarry limestone a short distance north-east of the Warm Springs, and for the right of wagon road for hauling, referred to the Committee on Public Grounds.

Petition of Higgins Davis, asking the privilege of frontage on the south side of Market Square, to erect an office, referred to Committee on Markets.

Petition of Sebree & Robertson, asking for a portion of the street and sidewalk in front of the Bain Wagon Depot, First East Street, on which to pile building material, for thirty days, granted, under the direction of the Street Supervisor.

Petition of C. P. Troy for auctioneer's license for one year, granted, on condition that the place of business be designated before license is given.

The opinion of Snow and Hoge, City attorneys, on the matter of the communication of the "committee of eleven" appointed by the "committee of forty-five" non-"Mormon" tax payers, asking the privilege of making transcripts of the accounts of the City, was read. The opinion will be found, in full, in another part of to-day's News.

Petition of John Proctor and others, asking that certain portions of streets in the 10th Ward be placed under repair, was called up and referred to committee on streets and alleys.

Petition of E. M. Barnum, relating to the numbering of the buildings of the city, was called up and referred to the committee on improvements.

Report of M. H. Peck, sealer of weights and measures, was submitted and received.

The Mayor made a few remarks regarding the advisability of regulating the weighing of coal, there being some dissatisfaction among consumers regarding the matter.

A few bills were received and allowed, when the Council adjourned till next Tuesday evening.

Roll called. Quorum present.

The following was received and read:

Your Committee, to whom was referred C. F. No. 32, "An Act in relation to Marshals and Attorneys," would respectfully ask leave to report that they have considered said bill and recommend it be placed upon its passage.

Said bill (C. F. 32), "An Act in relation to Marshals and Attorneys," was taken up on its second reading, and,

On motion of Mr. Thurber, said bill was read the third time by its title, amended, and,

On motion of Mr. Morrison, the bill passed.

The title was read and approved. The following messages were received and read:

The following was received and read:

Hon. Speaker and Members of the House:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee on Municipal Corporations and Townships, to whom was referred the following petitions of J. S. Page and James Finlayson, citizens of Salt Lake City, and of E. B. Davis, Mayor of Springville, in behalf of many citizens, of Knute Peterson and fifty-two other citizens of Ephraim City, of D. H. Davis and eight other citizens of Spanish Fork, of A. J. Moffet and twenty-six other citizens of Mant, and of A. R. Whitehead and twenty-four other citizens of Washington, Kane Co., all praying for amendments and additions to their city charters. And also, H. F. 56, a bill for an act amending the laws relating to the Territory of Utah," approved Feb. 16, 1874.

The House concurred in the

further action thereon for the following reasons: This honorable body have already acted upon the subject matter of these petitions on petitions from other cities, which action has been disapproved by the Governor. It is clear, therefore, that these much needed amendments and additions prayed for, and notwithstanding the demand of the people to maintain good order, and protect themselves from the many evils incident to the influx of a transient, mining and frontier population, and provide for the regulation and protection, within their corporate limits, of the many recent improvements introduced into the country, such as railroads, gas works, smelters, telegraph lines, depot grounds, &c., &c. It is the opinion of your committee, that nothing having in view the granting of the prayers of said petitioners, and that no measure that would materially benefit the inhabitants of said cities would meet with the approval of his Excellency the Governor.

On motion of Mr. Peacock, the report of the committee was adopted.

A message was received and read from the Council:

"The Council have passed the Territorial Appropriation Bill, and amended the same by inserting \$2,400.00 in aid of the Pimpango branch of the Deseret University. And have stricken out \$3,000.00 for Centennial Board of Commissioners, &c."

"Restored \$1,000.00 for Territorial road south of Provo River bridge."

"Restored \$500.00 for Round Valley road."

"And inserted \$1,000.00 for St. George Normal School."

"To J. D. T. McAllister, Sergeant at Arms of Council, \$35.00."

"To S. Young, sen., services, \$120.00."

"And forward the same for your action."

"Respectfully, LORENZO SNOW, 'President of the Council.'"

Said amendments were read, and all concurred in, except the \$1,000 for Territorial road south of Provo River bridge.

Councilor Young, in behalf of Committee of Conference from the Council on (C. F. 11), "An act to regulate fees and compensation for official and other services in the Territory of Utah," announced that the Council Conference committee was ready to take the matter into consideration.

On motion the Speaker appointed Messrs. S. S. Smith, Pace and Rockwood said committee on the part of the House.

On Motion of Mr. Jos. F. Smith \$50.00 was ordered to be placed in the Territorial appropriation bill for the extra enrolling and engrossing clerks.

A message was received and read from the Council, announcing that the Council had passed (H. F. 60), "An Act to amend the Charter of Beaver City," also passed (H. F. 40), with amendments, and non-concurred in. House amendments to (C. F. 23), "An Act to regulate proceedings in civil cases, &c.," and had appointed Messrs. Hooper, Caine and Harrington a committee of conference on said bill to act with a like committee from the House.

Whereupon the Speaker appointed the Judiciary Committee a committee of conference on part of the House on said bill.

A message from the Council was received and read, announcing the passage of (C. F. 44), A bill for "An Act repealing an Act to provide for compiling and publishing the Laws of Congress applicable to the Territory of Utah," approved Feb. 18, 1872.

Said bill (C. F. 44), A bill for "An Act repealing an Act to provide for compiling and publishing the Laws of Congress applicable to the Territory of Utah," approved Feb. 18, 1872, was read the first time, and,

On motion of Mr. Thurber, said bill was read the second time, amended, and,

A message was received from the Council, announcing the passage of (C. F. 43), "An Act to provide for a general lien for common carriers and for the sale of property not delivered," which was read the first time, and,

On motion of Mr. Cliff, said bill was read the second time, and,

On motion of Mr. Mann, said bill was read the third time by its title, and,

On motion of Mr. Halliday, the bill passed.

The title was read and approved.

A message was received and read from the Council, announcing the passage of joint resolution in relation to the location of a Territorial road through Davis county.

Mr. S. S. Smith, Chairman of Committee of Conference on (C. F. 11), "An Act providing for fees, &c.," reported having agreed to certain amendments to said bill, and recommended its passage as amended, which was read, and,

On motion of Mr. Morrison, the report of the Committee was adopted.

The following message was received and read from his Excellency the Governor:

"UTAH TERRITORY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 20, 1874."

Hon. Orson Pratt, Sec., Speaker, House of Representatives.

"Sir—An Act amendatory of the laws relating to the Territory of Utah, is herewith returned without my approval."

A message was received and read from the Council.

Announcing further amendments to (C. F. 44), "An Act repealing an Act to provide for compiling and publishing the Laws of Congress applicable to the Territory of Utah," approved Feb. 16, 1874.

The House concurred in the

amendments of the Council, and, On motion of Mr. Thurber, said bill was further amended.

A message was received and read from the Council.

Announcing the passage of (H. F. 27), "An Act supplementary to an act entitled 'An Act relating to defrauding, cheating or swindling,' &c."

Also a Concurrent Resolution for the amendment of the laws relating to the compilation and codification of the laws of Utah Territory.

Said Concurrent Resolution was read and passed.

A message was received and read from the Council.

Announcing the passage of (H. F. 62), "An Act to amend an Act providing for the incorporation of railroad companies, and the management of the affairs thereof, approved March 18th, 1873."

Also (H. F. 57), "An Act providing for the election of Probate Judges," with amendments.

The House concurred with Council amendments in (H. F. 37), "An Act providing for the election of Probate Judges."

A memorial to Congress asking for legislative enactment on school lands, which passed the Council, was read, and,

On motion of Mr. Taylor, House reconsidered its action on said bill, and the vote passing the same was rescinded.

A message was received and read from the Council, announcing the passage of (C. F. 45), "An Act providing damages for death caused by wrongful act, neglect or default," which was read the first time, and,

On motion of Mr. Morrison, said bill was read the second time, and,

On motion of Mr. Morrison, said bill was read the third time by its title, and,

On motion of Mr. Morrison, the bill passed.

The title was read and approved. The House went into joint session.

(See Joint Session minutes.)

The House resumed its sitting.

On motion of W. G. Smith, the House took a recess for twenty minutes.

Seconded and carried.

On Motion of Mr. Pace \$400.00 was ordered to be placed in the Territorial appropriation bill for services of two chaplains of this Legislative session.
