HOW TO DESTROY THIS DAMAGING

WILLARD, Nov. 2, 1886.

Editor Deseret News: As many persons are desirous to know how to get rid of weevil now destroying their wheat in their granaries, I have concluded to write a word to farmers and persons interested h holding and storing wheat. Take slaked lime and run it through a fine sieve to take ont all coarse lamps. Then mix the fine lime with your wheat, bringing the lime in contact with every kernel and the weevil will leave your wheat and granaries at once. From one to one and a half bushels of lime will lime from six to seven hundred bushes of wheat. If you should happen to use more lime it will

do no harm to your wheat.

The question may be asked, will the lime injure the wheat for the manufacture of first-class flour? No, it will not. On this matter I have consulted with some of the best millers and mill men in Utah. M. W. Dalton.
