VEDDER-TREZISE KILLING.

Los Angeles Times Says the California Conductor Cannot be Convicted.

Under a caption implying the above thought the Los Angeles Times says; There is little probability that Conductor Vedder will ever be convicted of murder, or even manslaughter, for having killed William Trezise, if the evidence adduced at the coroner's inquest indicates what he could prove in event of his arrest. The testimony at the inquest showed that not only Vedder successfully plead self-defense, but another plea he could make with every probability of its success, is that he acted in defense of the company's property, and that his victim was engaged in committing an unlaw-ful act when he received the wound.

The case was not allowed to simply pass without any attention being paid to it by the local authorities. When the news of the killing was published the district attorney of San Diego county wrote to District Attorney Rives of os Angeles and requested that h have an assistant present at the in-quest. He stated that if the evi-dence showed that Vedder was culpa-ble, or that there was any probability of convicting him of any crime, his arrest would be ordered. Assistant District Attorney Fredericks attended the inquest and cross-examined all the witnesses. At the conclusion of the hearing, and while the jury was deliber. ating. Mr. Fredericks was asked wheth ating, Mr. Fredericks was asked wheth-er, in his opinion, the evidence justified the beginning of criminal proceedings against Vedder. He replied, unhesitat-ingly, that he was there for the pur-pose of ascertaining that, but he was certain that no case could be made against the conductor. The report to the district attorney of San Diego coun-try was to that offset. ty was to that effect. It is therefore not at all probable that even if the elder Trezise comes here, a complaint will be issued against Vedder.
