The receipts very satisfactory condition. The receipts for the year from all sources amounted to \$21218.6 of which \$35,256 was received to \$21218.5 fees, \$5,500; the balance from the sources. Of the expendences and other sources. Of the expenditures, \$4,518 was paid for the maintenditures, \$4,518 was paid for the maintenditures, \$4,518 or interest; \$14,518 for interest \$1,512, for interest; \$14,510 for the new addition to the county court-house, \$452, for hooks; \$14,545, for salaries; \$1,512 for road improvement. The report shows \$10,000 cash in the treasury.

LOGAN SCHOOL FINANCES.

The annual statement issued by the city heard of education shows \$35,004.69 received from all sources during the last school year. \$5,500 was received from taxes, was borrowed from the bank, and the balance came from rents, interest, tultion, etc. The principal items of expenditures were: Salary paid lady teachers,
