#### RESIDENTS PROTEST.

A dozen residents of B street sub-mitted a protest against the granting of a franchise to the Utah Light & Ralway company for tracks on B street between First and Third ave-nues. A street is now used between the Sixth street route. The company intends to cut out the curve at the corner of B street and Third avenue, which necessitates the slowing down of cars on "down" trips.
