

# How Pioneers Prepared for Winter in 1859

Great Quantities of Wood Hauled from the Mountains—Latest Train from the East—California Emigrants Get Away With Uncle Sam's Mules at Camp Floyd—Indians Kill the Mail Carriers.

(From the Files of the Deseret News of 1859.)

**From Box Elder.**—The citizens of Brigham City, Willard, and other settlements in that county are said to be improving the favorable season now presented in good advantage in putting in fall wheat and getting wood out of the mountains for winter, the same as in most other parts of the Territory heard from of late.

**Providing for Winter.**—The streets of the city leading to the canyons have lately been jammed with teams going to and from, and hundreds of loads of wood have lately been hauled into the city from the Cottonwoods, Millers, Big Canyon, Emigration and City Creek on the East, from the several canyons on the West mountains, and from the canyons in Davis county, and from other places where it can be found. It is said that there is an opportunity for those who live in this valley last winter to get out of fuel when the mountains are not accessible, as has been the case, more or less, every winter since the settlement of the Territory. Every person who does not insure it to too late, provide himself with fuel for the winter should be watched closely, for such will not be so easy to get when the "border" wood from their neighbors without any intention of returning.

**The Last Arrival.**—Mr. E. R. Young arrived from the States on the 27th ult. (Oct. 1859), with a train of eight or ten wagons, the last that may be expected this season.

**From the South.**—We learn that the detachment of U. S. dragoons who left Camp Floyd some time since for the purpose of overhauling and arresting certain swindlers, who had taken the wrong mules at or before the time of leaving Camp Floyd for California, were returning without having accomplished the object for which they were sent.

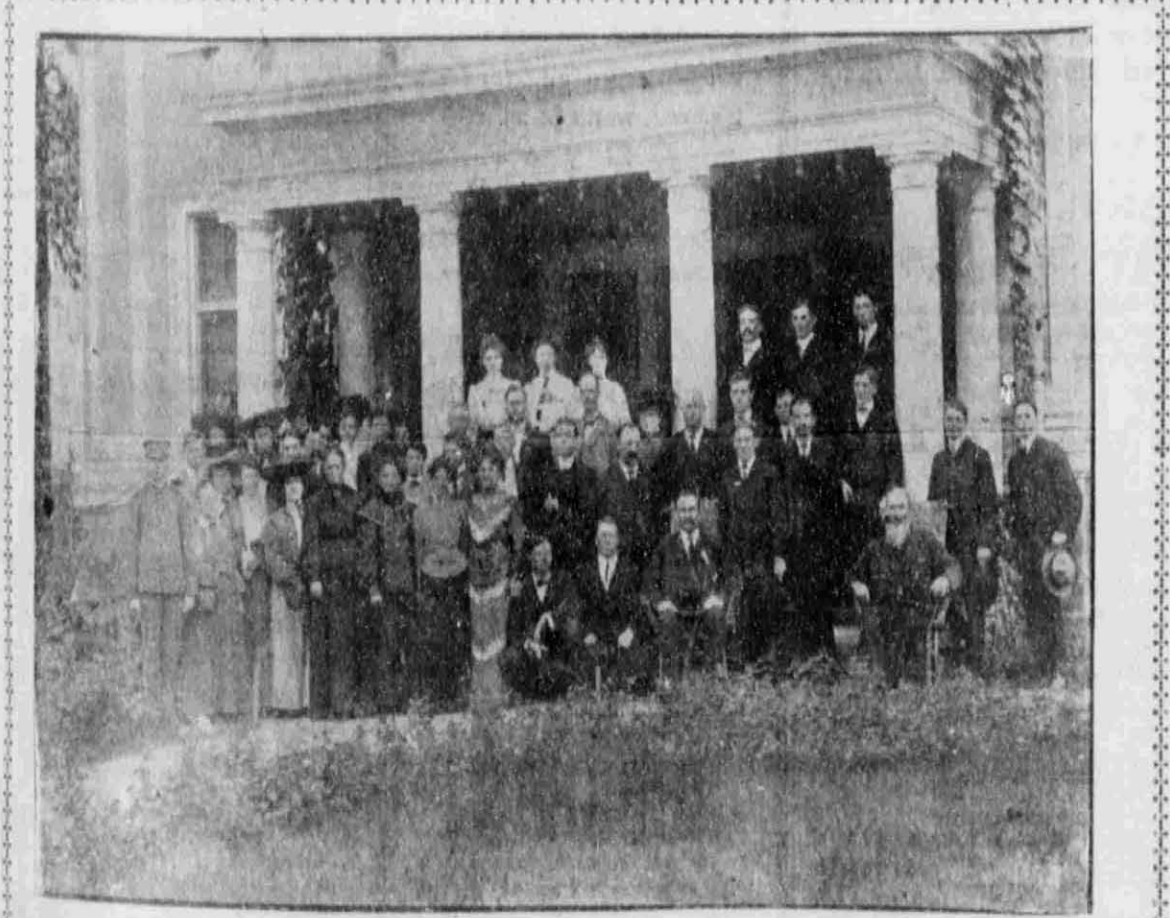
**By Eastern Mail.**—The Eastern mail arrived yesterday a little before noon, (Nov. 9) by which we have New York dates to Oct. 15. The latest dates from Liverpool are Sept. 29.

**The Postmaster-General** has received word from Mr. Hall Missouri mail contractor on the Santa Fe route, stating that the mail which left Fort Independence was attacked by the Kiowa Indians on the 24th of August, and Conductor Smith and his brother were killed, and William Cole badly wounded. The troops on the Arkansas river had gone to Fort Riley, and the mail cannot run unless troops are stationed at Pawnee Fork, with an escort to Cold Spring. The incoming Santa Fe mail due on the 4th of Sept. did not arrive till the 10th.

**DEFECTS IN OUR CANALS.**  
The purpose of a canal is to convey water from one place to another, but it is not enough that we merely provide a channel, we should also ascertain if it will hold water. If not, the proper remedy is to excavate the bed, when the canal is being built. It costs but a trifle more to excavate the bed a few inches below grade and fill the space thus made with good masonry. If this were done at the worst places along the route, the value of the water thus saved in one season would frequently pay for the extra cost involved. Here in the Rocky mountain states, instead of using imperfect channels, such as lined canals and closed pipes, water is conveyed in open ditches over porous formations of loose earth and gravel.
