## PROPOSITION FOR NEW WATERWORKS

Special Council Committee Estimates Its Cost at \$350,000.

## AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY.

More Libel Suits Against Mayor—Prof. L. R. Austin Will be High School Principal—Disastrous Fires.

Ogden, Utah, July 26.—At the meeting of the city council last night the special water committee, composed of Chairman Davidson, Craig, Williams and Chambers, reported the result of their investigations, respecting the estimated cost of constructing a new waterworks system for Ogden. The report was that a new system could be constructed with water mains throughout the entire city, with two large reservoirs with entire cement linings, at a cost of \$350,000, and without the cement linings and the reservoirs, at a cost of \$250,000. These figures are considerably lower than have been expected by many, and the committee's report was very favorable for the city's budget for enough money with which to construct a system. The city has a bonded margin of \$234,000, which is \$100 less than enough to construct the system, but the committee suggested that this amount could be met out of the general fund during the next two years.

It was suggested by the committee that instead of issuing bonds for \$75,000 for the construction of sewers that the city might set up for this amount, which would be put to a vote of the people next month. The report was referred to the finance committee.

Bids were received for the construction of the sewer in district No. 10, as follows: Olli, Martin & Dittman, \$35,000; Joseph Kennedy of Fargo, N. D., \$30,000; Hanley & Richards, \$28,000; 121st Street, \$28,000; J. P. O'Neill, \$27,000. All were referred to the finance committee.

The council voted to each member an allowance of \$100 for services rendered during 1934 and 1935, as members of boards of equalization and special taxes.

The council decided to macadamize Washington avenue from Twenty-second street to the Ogden river bridge, and one block on Grant avenue between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets in front of the city station. This work will be done by the city during the next month.

The report was received from the public works committee that the city has obtained jurisdiction of the Washington avenue from Twenty-second street to the Ogden river bridge for the construction of sidewalks on both sides of the street. They also reported a number of objections to the curbing and widening of Adams avenue between Twenty-fifth and Thirty-third streets, which were referred to the city engineer to see if they will be sufficient to require the proposition of building the curb.

John S. Lewis submitted a communication to the council recommending it to purchase a tract of about 250 acres of canyon just east of the city for public use, and that they also appropriate \$25,000 for purchasing the grounds should they purchase it.

A petition was received from residents on Madison street, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fifth streets, and between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-seventh streets, asking that the city engineer order the curbing and widening of Adams avenue between Twenty-fifth and Thirty-third streets, which were referred to the city engineer to see if they will be sufficient to require the proposition of building the curb.
