LATE LOCALS.

Bank Clearings—Today's local bank clearings amounted to \$1,588,474.28 as against \$1,000,800.85 for the same day last year.

Reports Wanted—The state board of equalization is anxious to receive from the auditors of Emery, Kane, Platts and Washington counties, their reports so that the state board may be able to complete its biennial report to the legislature.

First Edition Tomorrow—Tomorrow's official organ of the United Republic League will make its first appearance before the public. The paper will be published weekly and will be devoted to the interests of the United Republic League which was recently formed in this city and is to become a state organization. J. G. Weaver is the editor of the paper.

His Leg Broken—Col. John Willard of Eleventh East street, had the misfortune to have his leg caught in a rope the other day, while leading a cow, and was dragged some distance

before he could disentangle himself. It was then discovered that his leg was broken. He is resting at home as well as could be expected.

J. W. Musser Named—Murray Shepherd has resigned his position as assistant secretary of the Utah Light and Railway company, and Joseph W. Musser has been appointed in his place. Mr. Musser will also act as chief clerk to the general manager. E. M. Bagley has been appointed claims attorney vice Joseph F. McKnight who has resigned because of protracted ill health and gone to southern California.

Civil Service Exams—There will be civil service examinations in this city Jan. 9, for the position of forest planting assistant, at \$700 per annum in the forest service of the department of agriculture. The duties of the position are preparation of seed beds, seed sowing, transplanting, care of seedlings and field planting. The work is largely manual labor. There will also be an examination for the position of planter in the quartermaster's department at large, at \$900 per annum; also, for the position of manual training teacher, at the Haskell Institute, Kas., at \$900 per annum.

Suit for Insurance—The representatives of the New York Life Insurance company in this city, state that in the suit at Ogden against the company for a death claim of \$2,000, by the widow, Mary A. Simer, the point at issue is not any inclination of the company to avoid paying the claim, but to know to whom it should be paid. The deceased, it is alleged, hypothesized his life insurance to pay a debt, and the widow does not appear ready to recognize the transfer, and wants the money herself.

Will Begin Suit—City Treasurer Swenson announces that unless those who are delinquent in the payment of their licenses call at his office at once and settle up he will start suit at once against all delinquents. Here, before the license inspectors of the treasurer's office have gone to business houses and collected the license but the city council recently passed a resolution, instructing the inspectors to merely inspect the licenses and not collect the same but to require the merchants to pay the license at the treasurer's office. A number of them have failed to do so and unless they pay up they will be prosecuted for doing business without a license.
