

## HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY MEETS.

Salt Lake County Association  
In Session at Mur-  
ray.

### FIRST OUT OF SALT LAKE.

Importance of Proper Spraying Re-  
ceived Considerable Attention—  
Law to be Strictly Enforced.

The regular meeting of the Salt Lake County Horticultural society was held at Murray yesterday afternoon. This was the first meeting held outside of Salt Lake City, and the attendance was good. First Vice President Stooky made a talk on the importance of properly spraying trees, and made a motion that the county tree inspector, with the aid of his deputies and the commissioners and county attorney, strictly enforce the new horticultural law. The motion was carried.

Another motion was made and carried that one orchard in each of the five districts be selected by the inspector to be sprayed so as to instruct the members of the society in the correct manner of spraying. At the close of the meeting Inspector Sorenson gave his deputies the following instructions in regard to their duties:

#### INSTRUCTIONS TO DEPUTIES.

An inspector should have a general knowledge of insects and of the injuries which they may inflict on trees or fruits, and he should also know the best way to exterminate them and what remedies or preventatives to use before the insects have done much damage.

He should always remember that different trees are suited to different localities and soils, and that what may be a great success in one locality may be an utter failure in another. It is always better to say "I don't know," than it is to give advice not strictly reliable.

It is a most serious thing for a man to plant five or ten acres of ground in trees, only to find that a serious mistake has been made. Yet such mistakes are by no means uncommon. Great mistakes are also often made in choosing varieties. An inspector visiting people should not waste time in talking about the weather (he can't change it), or about politics (he is not paid for that), or about horses, pigs or stock (likely the other man knows more about that kind of business). He should get into the orchard, use his eyes, see what is wanted, tell the owner about it, and get away to the next place.

He should talk about what is required at that time and particularly advise people not to be carried off their feet by fads and fancies. On the other hand, if any choice and profitable varieties of fruit make their appearance,

An inspector should be alert and take due notice of the same by making correct notes, both of the owner's name and of the locality where produced, and such other data as will give reliable and complete information as to the new product, for the purpose of enabling those interested to cut grafts or scions from the trees.

#### GENUINE IMPROVEMENTS.

An inspector should remember that there is room for genuine improvement on all varieties of fruit and that the best should always be selected to cut buds and to graft from. If there are any nurseries in an inspector's district, such should be thoroughly looked after, so that they may not be-

come centers of infection and disease. And nurseries are entitled to special protection from infested orchards in their vicinity. All orchards, near a nursery should be particularly well looked after, so that they may not infect the nurseries. Likewise all nurseries should be carefully inspected, and should be fumigated and quarantined.

There is another point for inspectors to guard against. Many people will say, "We have no pump; we can't spray our trees; but if you will send a sprayer we will pay him for the work," and when they have made that remark they seem to think it fills the bill and clear them of any responsibility.

Now, let it for once be clearly understood around to spray their trees, but to see that the trees are sprayed and cleaned, and that the trees do not become an infection and a nuisance to the whole neighborhood. And it is no more an inspector's duty to spray their trees or provide a sprayer for them than it is to bring them a washing machine and to engage a washwoman, or a scavenger for them if needed, but it is the duty of every owner of trees to spray them and keep them clean as much as his back yard, or any other property he possesses.

#### SKOGLUND OBSEQUES

On Sunday, at 12 o'clock, at the Forest Dale meetinghouse, funeral services will be held over the remains of Lovisa Skoglund, a highly respected woman of that ward. She was born May 3, 1823, in Bohus, Sweden, and became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on the 11th of July, 1882, being baptized by Elder Gustave Johnson. She emigrated to Utah in 1893. Mrs. Skoglund was the mother of Mrs. Emma Skoglund Teidt, wife of Dr. Gustave W. Teidt. The deceased lady was at one time president of the Relief society in Gothenburg, Sweden, and did a great work among the Saints of her native country. She was possessed of a sweet and amiable disposition, and was much esteemed by a wide circle of friends.




