"I decline to have my name submit-ted to this convention in any manner!" he shouted, and walked off the plat-form, followed by the cheers of the Hearst delegates, William C. Crolius of Joliet followed

in a brief speech endorsing the stand taken by Mr. Prentiss, and also with-drew his name from the convention.

Then came another long wait, during which the wildest confusion prevailed on the floor and several fist fights took place between the delegates. At this point the platform was sub-

nitted and adopted. The resolutions providing for the endorsement of Mr. Hearst were not made a part of the report of the committee on resolutions but were submitted to the convention as a separate matter.
