### BATTLE FOUGHT, RESULT UNKNOWN.

Japanese Made Repeated Attempts  
To Dislodge Left Flank of  
The Russians.

### THE LATTER LOST HEAVILY.

May Prove to Have Been an Important  
Encounter—News Anxiously Awaited.

St. Petersburg, June 14.—Emperor Nicholas has received the following telegram from Lieut.-Gen. Baron Stakelberg, bearing today's date:

"A battle began at noon around the Russian position four and a half miles south of the station of Vafangow (Vafangow), the enemy making repeated attempts to dislodge our left flank. The attack was repelled and we retained our position."

"The first regiment, occupying the left flank of our position, sustained severe losses. Its commander, Col. Khavastouff, and Adj. Sub-Lieut. Dragachoff Nodochinsky, were killed. Gen. Gennosov was wounded, a shrapnel bullet shattering the right side of his lower jaw, but he remained on the field."

St. Petersburg, June 15 (3:16 a. m.).—The general staff remained in session until almost 1 o'clock this morning to translate and give out Lieut.-Gen. Baron Stakelberg's message announcing the fight at Vafangow. This unusually

late hour indicates that the authorities attach considerable importance to the dispatch.

It is thought here that the Vafangow affair may prove to have been quite a heavy fight. The fact that the Russians held their position to the face of heavy losses also supports this theory, and it is believed that it may turn out to be a severe check to the Japanese northern advance.

The movement of 3,000 Japanese north of Kuan Dian Shan only adds to the blindness of the situation in the northeastern field of operations. It is unquestionable that the "cosacks" have been worrying the Japanese north of Feng Wang Cheng, and the movement may be merely an effort to clear the country. At the same time this movement holds the possibility of a demonstration against Mukden, one of the many roads leading directly east from Mukden toward the region to which the Japanese are advancing. The consensus of opinion, however, is that the advance is more in the nature of a demonstration than a preliminary to an actual attack.

A special dispatch from Liao Yang, dated June 14, says:

"Yesterday (Monday), at the battle of Vafangow, Japanese troops numbering 20,000 tried to pass our flank, but were discovered. We changed our position, flanking the Japanese, and opened a heavy fire. The result is unknown."

The date of this dispatch does not agree with the Associated Press dispatch from Liao Yang or with Lieut.-Gen. Baron Stakelberg's message to the emperor, both of which indicate that the battle took place yesterday (Tuesday). It is thought improbable that there have been two attacks.

### RUMOR OF HEAVY FIGHTING.

Newchwang, June 14, 10 p. m. (Delayed in transmission).—There are persistent rumors here of severe fighting south of Kai Chou, which it is impossible to confirm. Of three trustworthy messengers sent out on the night of June 12, two returned, having been unable to pass the Russian lines at Kai Chou and the other is expected to arrive early tomorrow. The two who have returned learned nothing except that the Russians are becoming more strict about allowing natives to pass through their lines.

Twenty hospital cars passed here this morning, traveling southward.

The trains are only running six miles south of Kai Chou.

A report upon the very highest authority direct from Mukden says there are over 20,000 Russian troops there, with 40,000 additional men camped at Liao Yang.

It is believed here that the Russians are moving a force of 65,000 men south only to make it appear as though they were attempting to relieve Port Arthur, and that upon the first encounter with the enemy it will be withdrawn north again.

A private telegram received here by a German resident late this afternoon from Chefoo said that the Japanese had suffered a severe defeat at Port Arthur and the Russians in town are celebrating the news tonight.

The Russian troops are now constructing a deep moat surrounding Liao Yang upon all sides, three miles from the town and are mounting artillery upon the adjacent hills.

Ships arriving from Shanghai and Chefoo report passing a Japanese cruiser five miles out from Kai Chou.

### ENGLISH FARO.

Fred Warren Loses Five Thousand  
In Ten Minutes on the Game.

New York, June 14.—That it is possible to lose \$5,000 in 10 minutes by playing "English faro" in New York, that the police do not know where the game is played, and that the victim may have no legal remedy were facts brought out today in a case heard before Magistrate Mayo in the West Side court.

Frederick Warren of Buffalo was the complainant and the prisoner was his friend, Peter Forrester, also of Buffalo. The latter had ably cut head, which he stated the complainant had caused by striking him with a cane.

Warren told the magistrate that Forrester had told him that a friend of his had made \$20,000,000 in Wall street and that the corporation which he represented could be parted from a great deal of its money providing he was in sight to play a combination against the corporation. Upon this representation Warren says he drew \$5,000—the savings of a lifetime—from a bank in Buffalo, and came to this city.

When he reached New York in the evening, he says, Forrester took him to a place and introduced him to seven other members of the corporation. Almost immediately a game which he afterwards learned was called "English faro" was proposed and Warren was assured that he could not lose. Ten minutes later, however, he told the magistrate, his \$5,000 had vanished across the board. He then turned upon Forrester, accused him of robbery and struck him on the head with a cane. He was unable to tell the magistrate where the game was played, and when Forrester told the court that he also had played and lost \$5,500, the complainant was informed that he had no redress and the prisoner was discharged.

"You really came down from Buffalo for the purpose of beating somebody else," said Magistrate Mayo to Warren, "and in that case the law does not help you even in a civil way. That has been decided by the court of appeals. There is no evidence here of a crime and I will have to discharge the prisoner."

### VINCENT KERENS.

Committeeman Kerens' Son Sued  
By a Gambler.

St. Louis, Mo., June 15.—Vincent Kerens, son of Republican National Committeeman Richard C. Kerens, and a prominent young society man of St. Louis, is named defendant in a suit filed today in the circuit court by Pat Sheedy, a well known sporting man, to recover \$20,000 on a promissory note which he avers Kerens gave to a man named Arthur Pierce, now dead, at Ostend, Belgium, July 20, 1900. In his petition Sheedy states that the note came into his possession "in the usual course of business."

Vincent Kerens, in an interview, admitted the genuineness of the note, but declared the paper was non-negotiable and that under the law Sheedy could not recover on it. Mr. Kerens' father said his son fell into the hands of sharpers and that the note given to Pierce was the outcome.

### Fortune For a Train Guard.

New York, June 15.—At one time a lieutenant in the French army and now a guard on the Brooklyn Rapid Transit train, Desire Bretigniere has been notified by members of his family in France that his father is dead, leaving an estate of which the guard is heir to the extent of \$300,000. Bretigniere came to New York ten years ago and obtained his first employment as a news agent.

### Commemorate Hamilton's Death.

New York, June 15.—A movement has been started in Weehawken for a patriotic demonstration July 9, in commemoration of the one-hundredth anniversary of the death of Alexander Hamilton, who was killed in a duel by Aaron Burr. A small marble slab now marks the spot where Hamilton fell. The promoters of the demonstration intend to inaugurate a movement to replace this slab with a suitable monument.

### THE DEMOCRATS OF ILLINOIS.

They Nominate a Full State Ticket  
And Instruct Delegates for  
W. R. Hearst.

### CARTER HARRISON UNSEATED.

John P. Hopkins Manipulated the  
Convention to Suit Himself and  
Rout His Enemies.

Springfield, Ill., June 14.—The Democratic state convention today nominated the following ticket:

Governor—Lawrence B. Stringer of Lincoln.  
Lieutenant Governor—Thomas J. Ferns of Jerseyville.  
Secretary of State—Frank E. Dooling of Sangamon county.

State Treasurer—Charles B. Thomas of Mr. Lamsboro.

Attorney General—Albert Watson of Jefferson county.

University Trustees—Mrs. Anna G. Solomon of Chicago, Theodore C. Lohr of Carlinville, P. B. Merrill of St. Clair county.

Delegates-at-large to St. Louis Convention—John P. Hopkins, A. M. Lawrence, Ben T. Cable, Samuel Alschuler. The convention instructed the delegates to the national convention to vote for William R. Hearst at St. Louis as long as his name remains before the convention.

Hearst's campaign managers, who attempted to ride into power by the aid of his name, received absolutely no consideration from the convention. The Harrison party, which came solely from Chicago and was pledged to the support of Congressman James R. Williams, was routed completely. Carter H. Harrison was unseated as a delegate and took a train for home without going near the convention. His faction and the Hearst party were as nothing as compared with the strength and skillful management of the convention exhibited by John P. Hopkins. Hopkins will continue to be chairman of the state central committee.

John P. Quinn of Peoria, who presided over the convention both as temporary and permanent chairman, paid absolutely no attention to the motions made by him. He did not jibe with the interest of the Hopkins party for him to do so, and in one instance, at least, he declared a ruling carried before the Hearst and Harrison people had voted upon it. The committee on resolutions finished its work early, but it was decided by the chairman to withhold its report until he knew what action the Hearst party would take on the report of the committee on credentials. The report of the committee on credentials said simply:

"We believe everything done by the state central committee in seating and unseating delegates was just and proper, and we recommend that its work be endorsed."

The report was adopted, Chairman Quinn refusing the demand of the Harrison and Hearst delegates for a roll call.

Pending the arrival of the committee on resolutions a motion was carried directing the convention to proceed with the nomination of candidates for state offices.

William Prentiss of Chicago, who was a candidate for governor, advanced to the front of the platform and declared passionately that he desired nothing from the convention, which did not, in his opinion, represent the Democracy of Illinois, and he wished for nothing at its hands.

"I decline to have my name submitted to this convention in any manner," he shouted, and walked off the platform, followed by the cheers of the Hearst delegates.

William C. Croll of Joliet followed in a brief speech endorsing the stand taken by Mr. Prentiss, and also withdrew his name from the convention.

Then came another long wait, during which the wildest confusion prevailed on the floor and several fist fights took place between the delegates.

At this point the platform was submitted and adopted. The resolutions providing for the endorsement of Mr. Hearst were not made a part of the report of the committee on resolutions but were submitted to the convention as a separate matter.

### GEN. SHERMAN BELL IS MAGNANIMOUS.

He Will Permit Henry George, Jr.,  
To Visit the Great Camp of  
Cripple Creek.

### "COLORADO IS IN AMERICA."

Assures Him Every Courtesy and  
Attention Under Military  
Jurisdiction.

Victor, Colo., June 15.—Reports have reached the district that Henry W. George, Jr., would come here for the purpose of looking into the labor difficulties and that the intention was to immediately arrest him. This report gained such headway that General Bell decided to issue the following order which he personally sent to Mr. George, who is now in Denver:

"It having come to the knowledge of the military commander that Henry George, Jr., of New York, is contemplating a visit to the greatest gold mining district in all the world, Cripple Creek, for the purpose of thoroughly investigating conditions, and the reports being in circulation throughout the country that he would be arrested, it is hereby ordered that said Henry George, Jr., who is a law-abiding American citizen who has the good of this country at heart at all times, shall be treated as an honored guest by officers and enlisted men in the national guard of Colorado, and the 40,000 loyal law-abiding citizens of Teller county, Colo."

"Assuring him every courtesy and attention under military jurisdiction with every possible convenience and protection as long as he cares to remain in our district as a citizen of the United States with the advance guarantee and assurance that 'Colorado is in America' today."

### MURDERER MILES.

Montana Prison Authorities Inclined to Believe His Story.

Butte, June 14.—Varden Thomas MacTague and Frank Conley, of the Montana penitentiary tonight expressed their opinion that the confession made by William Miles at Kansas City to the murder of John Edwards, a brakeman, near Deer Lodge in 1895, is probably correct. Edwards was found murdered at that time. A convict named Waltham believed to be alias for the man named Murphy mentioned in Miles' confession is now doing life in the penitentiary for the killing of a brakeman whose name, however, has been lost from the prison records.

### VICTIM OF ACCIDENT.

Funeral of Young Man Killed in McCormick Elevator Shaft.

The remains of J. Ernest Rees, the young man who met his death by falling down an elevator shaft, were tenderly laid to rest yesterday afternoon, services being held in the Fifth ward meetinghouse, commencing at 2 o'clock. The house was well filled with sympathizing relatives and friends, and the service was presided over by Bishop S. M. T. Seddon. Touching selections were rendered by the ward choir and after prayer by Elder Alex. Cowan, remarks of a consoling nature were made by Elders Thomas C. Nuttall, Samuel Holmes, Richard Brimley and Bishop Seddon, all of whom deplored the accident which so suddenly terminated a bright and promising career. The benediction was pronounced by Elder J. E. Salisbury. The beautiful white casket was covered with a profusion of floral emblems and the services throughout were deeply impressive. Interment was in the City cemetery.
