LOCAL BRIEFS.

Miss Hoag Seriously Ill—Miss Mary L. Hoag, a teacher in the Lowell school, was removed last evening to the L. D. S. hospital for a serious operation.

Hammer Property Sold—Paul Hammer has sold to Hyman Geffen for \$4,000, the premises 672 east Second South street, which the purchaser will occupy himself.

Sold to Western Pacific—The Western Pacific road has bought from Thomas Leslie part of lot 7, block 49, for \$4,500, the same to be used to improve track facilities.

Salaries Paid Today—The principals, supervisors and teachers of the city schools were paid their salaries today by Clerk Judson for the month ending March 2. The total amount of the payrolls is \$28,128.31.

Old Man Sent to Jail—Justice Lee of Bingham has ordered William Brennan to 90 days in the county jail for vagrancy. Brennan is very aged and has been a familiar figure around the town of Bingham for a number of years.

Meeting of Teachers—At a special meeting of the teachers of the city schools next Thursday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock in the public library auditorium an address will be made by Dr. George E. Vincent of the University of Chicago.

Intencement Fair—It is proposed to extend the coming Intencement fair through the months of August, September and October, when the mining display will be a special feature in the exhibits, showing that Utah is one of the best mining states in the Union.

Leads in Punctuality—The Jordan school stands at the head of the list in the matter of punctuality for the past school month. There are 70 pupils in the school and not one has been tardy during the month, hence the school stands 100 in the matter of punctuality.

Dance at Varsity—The senior Normals of the State University will give a dancing party in the Museum building this evening, for which elaborate preparations have been made. The chaperones are Prof. and Mrs. William M. Stewart, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph E. McKnight, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred C. Rees and Mr. and Mrs. John S. Welch.

Favorable to Howell's Bill—The house committee on public lands has reported favorably on Congressman Howell's bill to throw open Fort Crittenden for entry. This reservation was established by Gen. J. E. Johnston in 1858, and includes 137,000 acres of land. It was named after the then secretary of war, Floyd, who joined the secession. The bill is best adapted for dry farming.

To Build New Church—The congregations of the Norwegian and Danish Methodist churches will unite in erecting a new house of worship to cost \$20,000, a deal for a site was closed yesterday afternoon, when a site of 3x19 rods, owned by Katherine Rees and J. B. Loveland, at 521 fourth east street, for \$2,100. The old church property of the congregations on Second east between First and Second south streets, 74x145 feet, has been sold to George W. Evert for \$3,500.

Study of Hydraulics—The students in experimental hydraulics at the University began their regular work yesterday under Prof. Lyman. They are taking up a careful study of the experiments made by the famous French hydraulician M. Bazin. In the new hydraulic laboratory, the standard weir is to be an exact duplicate of the one used by him and from his experiments the students are deriving their formulae, which they will check by actual experiments when the laboratory is finished and they have reached the standard weir.

Wireless Station Here—H. A. Trenholm and H. P. O'Reilly of the Deseret Wireless Telegraph company, arrived in this city last evening, to look over the city with a view to establishing here a wireless telegraph station. The scheme has been successfully tried at several prominent centers in this and other countries, and a subsidiary company with \$1,000,000 capital has been organized in San Francisco. Re-lays across the American continent will be stationed at Chicago, Denver and Salt Lake City. Trenholm says that a successful attempt was recently made with a Chicago-Alton relay going at 50 miles an hour, and communications are frequent with vessels between New York and Panama.

OPINION BY BREEDEN.

Atty. Gen. Breeden gave the following opinion last evening, for the benefit of the state land board:

First—Has the state board of land commissioners the legal right to decline to sell state lands at private sale when the appraised price is offered therefor, after they have been recommended for sale at public auction, and remain unsold?

Second—If the state land board refuses to sell state lands at the appraised value thereof, is it then authorized to sell them at an advanced price above the appraised price upon the private offer of an applicant therefor, without reappraising and reoffering said lands at public auction?

Replying to the foregoing questions, I advise you that, in my opinion, both of said questions should be answered in the affirmative.

MOFFAT ROAD IS TO MAKE DIRT FLY

Work of Building Through to Salt Lake to be Crowded to The Limit.

WILL WORK FROM BOTH ENDS

David H. Moffat Wires That He Has Concluded All Arrangements to Push Operations.

Denver, March 9.—All arrangements have been made to go forward with the construction and completion of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific railroad (the Moffat Short Line) to its destination at Salt Lake City, with the utmost dispatch. A telegram received from David H. Moffat, now in New York, contained the following:

"Have concluded financial arrangements for pushing construction of road through to Utah. The work of building will be crowded ahead at once."

At the headquarters of the railroad here preparations have been under way for several days for building on a very much larger scale than has yet been attempted. Work on the road will be undertaken from the two ends of the line.

WESTERN PACIFIC

Work Starts on Line From Salt Lake End of Proposition.

Work has been started putting in a temporary track for construction work on the Western Pacific. The track is in the form of a short cut at the junction of the city and middle west between First South and South Temple streets. This track is to be pushed on to the banks of the Jordan river, where a temporary bridge will be erected and the grade pushed on to Buena Vista. There is also an outfall at work in the neighborhood of the proposed material yard at that point.

The Western Pacific has purchased a strip of land 10 rods in width extending from the west side of Sixth West through to the river.

In the meantime the work of tearing down houses is in full swing. Among those demolished are the former residences of Bishop Boud, John L. Johnson, Gus Backman and others. It is estimated that from now on work will be pushed on the building of the road through to the Pacific coast, and just as soon as track is laid on the existing grade work will be rushed in pushing across the desert before the hot weather sets in.

NEGLIGENCE CHARGED

Coroner's Jury Brings in Verdict Blaming Colorado & Southern.

(Special to the "News.")

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 9.—The coroner's jury that investigated the wreck of the Cheyenne Flyer at Buckhorn, which resulted in the death of Engineer Arthur Donahue and Fireman Louis Rex, and the serious injury of Mail Clerk Guy, today returned a verdict charging employees of the Colorado & Southern with negligence in not walking over the track ahead of the passenger train, as is required in the company's rules.

F. M. LEE WAS BOUNCED.

F. M. Lee filed suit in the district court today against the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company to recover damages in the sum of \$1,500 for being ejected from one of defendant's trains while enroute from this city to Bingham on July 6, 1905. Plaintiff boarded the train and tendered a ticket which the conductor refused, and upon the refusal of plaintiff to pay his fare he was forcibly ejected.

C. & N. W. STILL COMING WEST.

General Agent C. A. Walker of the Chicago & Northwestern here was this morning notified that the Wyoming & Northwestern, which is the Wyoming title of the C. & N. W. in that state, had opened up another station still further west. The new terminus is known as Walton, and is situated a little over 60 miles west of Casper. This means that the road is pushing west in the direction of Yellowstone park.

LAKE AND RAIL RATES.

New York, March 9.—At a meeting of trunk line traffic managers yesterday afternoon "lake and rail" rates to take effect on the opening of navigation were decided on. Comparing with rates a year ago they are 1/2 cent per bushel lower on wheat and flax, unchanged on barley and oats, and are 1/2 cent per bushel higher on rye and corn.

The new rates are: Wheat, 45 cents; flax, 45; rye, 45; corn, 4; barley, 4; oats, 3.

The new rates refer to export business only, and for the first time in some years higher "lake and rail" rates will be charged for local than for export grain business.

SPIKE AND RAIL.

C. O. Baxter, vice president of the Utah railroad, is in Salt Lake today. Charles Davidson, assistant city clerk agent of the Rio Grande, has returned from Butte.

Stanley H. Watson, industrial agent of the Houston & Texas Central, is numbered among the visiting railroad men.

J. W. Ellingson, chief clerk of the traffic department of the Salt Lake Route, has returned from his vacation trip to Phoenix, Ariz.

Corey Brothers' Construction company has secured the contract for the job of building the large reservoir for the Oregon Short Line at Pocatello.

General Agent C. A. Walker of the Chicago & Northwestern has just had Goldfield, Nev., added to his territory. He will in all probability start out on a trip of investigation tomorrow night.

Fifty tons of mail is the record for one day's weighing operations at the Ogden depot. Every pound of this has to be unloaded, placed on the scales and then transferred into the mail cars again.

E. B. Crandall, general baggage agent of the Salt Lake Route, has resigned. E. W. Newcomb, division foreman of signals on the Salt Lake division, has been appointed assistant engineer of the signal department for the Harrison line, with headquarters in Ogden.

The Salt Lake Route is now building extensive yards in the vicinity of the smelters at Garfield, which will consist of some 20 miles of track. A spur, or high line, is now built right up to the smelter site, starting about a mile west of the existing Garfield station.

The B. P. O. E. through Secretary A. W. Raybold, has addressed a complimentary and passenger agent of the Salt Lake Route, and the Salt Lake press, thanking both for the part taken in

making the recent record excursion to California a success.

"Hoodoo" engine 650, the one that climbed a frog in the Short Line yard here a week ago, has again distinguished itself. This time it slipped from the big crane in the repair shop in Ogden, and went crashing into the wrecking pit. Several machines had narrow escapes, one was working in the firebox and another in the smoke arch when it went crashing down. There was considerable damage done to the machinery and building.
