LAKE AND RAIL RATES.

New York, March 9 .- At a meeting of trunk line traffic managers yesterday new "lake and rail" rates to take ef-fect on the opening of navigation were decided on. Comparing with rates a year ago they are ½ cent per bushel lower on wheat and flax, unchanged on briev and oats, and are ½ cent per bushel higher on rye and corn. The new rates are: Wheat, 4½ cents; 412; rye, 416; corn, 4; barley, 4;

oats, 3. The new rates refer to export business only, and for the first time in some years higher "lake and rail" rates will be charged for local than for export grain business.
