Popular and Well Known Educator Placed at Head of Ogden School System.

Y.M.C.A. BUILDING FOR OGDEN

L. J. Willard Succumbs to Shop Accident—\$2,000,000 Mortgage on Bamberger Road.

Ogden, March 12.—Prof. John M. Mills was elected last evening by unanimous vote of the city board of education, to the position of city superintendent of schools in Ogden. Twenty-one persons had applied for the place, and after a long and close contest, Mr. Mills was chosen. He is 38 years old, and for the past 12 years has been active in school work. He holds an M. A. from the University of Chicago, where he took a three-year post-graduate course. During this time, also, he studied extensively the courses of study in primary and secondary schools, so that it is doubtful if any one in the state is more familiar with present conditions in the best thought concerning grade and high school education. In addition, Mr. Mills before going to Chicago, held the principalship of the L. D. S. high school at Salt Lake City, where he had large executive responsibility, which he carried with honor to himself and the school. He served a term in the last legislature, and at the close of which he acted on the committee to adjust the courses of study in the Agricultural college and the University of Utah. Mr. Mills will enter upon his new duties April 1. The office carries with it a salary of \$2,300.

Y. M. C. A. BUILDING.

Prominent Ogden Business Men Interested in Big Proposition.

Ogden, March 12.—Prominent business men of Ogden, including members from churches of every denomination, have started a campaign for the establishment of a Y. M. C. A. building in Ogden and have enlisted the services of all the prominent men of the city.

President A. R. Heywood of the Y. M. C. A. has addressed a communication to Messrs. M. S. Browning, J. W. Abbott, A. G. Fell, S. J. Griffin, J. C. Nye, H. H. Rolapp, Joseph Brown, and D. A. Smith, asking them to act as a committee to investigate, and make such further progress as within their judgment shall be expedient, for the construction of a Y. M. C. A. building and system in Ogden. It is reported that every member of the committee has taken the matter up earnestly, and will work for a creditable building for a club house in Ogden for the boys. The gentlemen of the committee it is stated together with others have sacrificed their intention of acting as a finance committee for the purpose of raising funds for the building.

INTERURBAN RAILWAY EXTENSION.

It was announced yesterday afternoon the Bamberger road had made a decision to extend the line up through Ogden to the city of Ogden. The extension of the line up through Ogden beginning next Monday. The poles will be of steel and very attractive and will be placed at the curb on both sides of the street and the trolley wires supported by cables running across the street. The road bed is being strengthened, two work trains being in use daily. While Senator Bamberger is busy rushing the electrification of his road, President Eccles of the Ogden Rapid Transit company is busy with the building of the line up through Ogden. The latter has also authorized the immediate beginning of the work upon the extension of the Rapid Transit through the Harrisville, Fair West and Plain City districts. Yesterday afternoon County Commissioners Madison and Moore went over the proposed route of the Harrisville extension with Messrs. Lyman Skogen, J. A. Taylor and J. M. Childs to whom the franchise was granted and who will build the line for the Rapid Transit company. A satisfactory route was chosen and work upon it will begin Monday morning.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

School Attendance Cut Off by Illness—Musical Festival.

Murray, March 12.—At the regular session of the city council held Tuesday evening, city engineer, who submitted a report recommending the payment of the city's portion of the construction of Vine street culvert for a distance of 570 feet at \$1.32, and for \$12.24 for engineering, advertising etc., leaving \$13.56 of which amount he recommended the payment of 80 per cent. On motion the recommendation was accepted and adopted and the amount ordered paid to the contractor.

The street committee submitted a report recommending that steps be taken to construct a cement bridge for the stream on the west side of State street in front of Mr. William Smith's residence and the adjacent property of the American Broedling & Hatching company for a distance of about 300 feet. Report was accepted and adopted.

The committee on municipal laws to whom was referred the matter of a revision of the city ordinances also submitted a report recommending that a resolution be passed authorizing the revision of the ordinances of Murray City, and that the city engineer be authorized at or before the time of making the appointment of a commission to revise the ordinances to report the estimated cost thereof. The report was accepted and adopted.

The finance committee recommended the payment of the following bills: The payment of bills against the city amounting to \$100.50. The special committee, to whom was referred the matter of the establishment of a public library submitted a report, recommending that Mr. Carnegie's offer to build a library building for the city of Murray at a cost of \$5,000 be accepted, and that the mayor of Murray City be authorized to notify Mr. Carnegie that the city will agree to spend \$500 per year to equip and maintain the same.

City Attorney Moffat offered several amendments to the franchise of the Utah Light & Heat company, which is still pending before the city council. The matter of repairing Record West street at the intersection of Murray street was referred to the street committee with power to act. The city attorney was instructed to prepare a resolution declaring side walk extension No. 2 to have been carried. Side walk extension No. 1
