

UNCOMPROMISING WAR ON TERRORISM

The Czar Sounds Call to it in His
Telegram of Congratulation
To Gov. Gen. Skallon.

"BE RESOLUTE IN BATTLE."

A Dictatorship for Poland is Hinted
At—Comments on Anniversary
of the First Parliament.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 18.—A call to an uncompromising war with terrorism and revolution in Poland was sounded in the imperial telegram of congratulation to Gov. Gen. Skallon. "Warsaw," says the Czar, "the bombs of would-be assassins at Warsaw Saturday, after thanking Divine providence for saving the governor-general's life for me and Russia," continues: "Do not be discouraged; be resolute in the battle with insensate anarchy and sedition."

Under present conditions in Poland it will be difficult to execute the imperial will, as the police have been practically driven from the streets of the Polish capital and the prevailing military measures are believed to be inadequate to cope with the revolutionists. Hence the text of the telegram is regarded here as indicating the intention of the emperor to strengthen the hands of Gov. Skallon in his successful struggle against the terrorism, by furnishing more troops, empowering the use of sterner methods than hitherto were permissible and the formation of a special ministry to take over the government of the Polish provinces.

The establishment of what is practically a dictatorship for Poland is hinted at by the Svet, the court organ. It is considered extremely probable that Gen. Skallon, even if he is not a victim of a second and more successful attempt on the part of the terrorists, may retire, either of his own volition, as did his predecessor after a similar nerve shaking experience, or at the request of the emperor, made as the result of representations from both the court and the army factions. It has been for some time past been urging his replacement by a stronger man.

The Russ, which has made a new appearance as the Okoye, turns its gaze upon flogging, which in spite of the imperial manifesto of 1894 abolishing it, is still employed in the repression of agrarian disorders. Prof. Kuzmin-Karavaleff contributes an essay on the subject in which he cites numerous examples of this method of punishment and declares it to be barbarous as well as absolutely futile.

It is said that the Pacific squadron will be formed again in the autumn, when practically all the available ships of the Baltic squadron, the Czarevitch, Sava, Gromobol, Bogatyr and the Rossiya will be dispatched to the far east.

Today was the anniversary of the proclamation of the first or Bouillon parliament and the newspapers devote their leading editorial articles to it. The Strana writes in an especially optimistic tone, declaring that in a year's time the people have definitely won the battle for popular representation and that the struggle now will be for the rights of the representatives in the assembly which often have been suppressed.

CANADIAN SUSPECT WAS NOT STENSLAND.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 18.—A stranger who was suspected of being Paul O. Stensland, the fugitive president of the failed Milwaukee Avenue State bank of Chicago, and who was detained by the Chicago police at Midway, B. C., has been permitted to go his way. The constable at Midway tonight stated that the man and the young woman who accompanied him did not correspond to the descriptions sent out by the Chicago police of Stensland and the woman who is supposed to have accompanied him. The provincial officers concluded that a mistake had been made and decided to drop the matter.

The man under suspicion, who was accompanied by a young woman, arrived at Midway several days ago. E. F. Noe, manager of a bank of Midway, came to the conclusion that the man was Stensland and notified the provincial officers of his suspicion. The stranger, who gave the name of Montgomery, said he was a mining man from Los Angeles. Following his experience with the officers, Mr. Montgomery left Midway, going by stage into the mining regions.

The message sent broadcast throughout the United States, giving a description of Stensland and asking for his arrest is as follows:

"Look out for and arrest for violation of the Illinois state banking law, Paul O. Stensland, about 35 years old, 5 feet 9 or 10 inches high, blue eyes, about 200 pounds in weight. Understand he has shaved his beard and has a smooth face. He is stout built and wears when last seen a light suit and straw hat. He is light complexioned, tending to sandy. He was last heard from at Duith. Send all information to Chief of Police Collins, 'INSPECTOR-IN-CHIEF SHIPPY.'"

GUATEMALAN REVOLUTION.

Leaders of Late One Will Meet in New York to Discuss Plans.

Mexico City, Aug. 18.—Leaders of the late revolution in Guatemala will meet in New York City some time next month, where, it is believed, they will discuss their plans for a new uprising which is expected to occur within a year. Gen. Barillas is now in San Francisco, Gen. Castillo is in Honduras, Gen. Toledo is in Nicaragua and Col. Pinedo is in New Orleans.

Well informed people in Central America predict that another and much better prepared revolution with the object of overturning the Cabrera administration in Guatemala is certain to be attempted. They deny that there is any real satisfaction in Guatemala among the people because of the restoration of peace, and assert that Cabrera was only saved by the intervention of the United States and Mexico, which intervention was largely due to a wish to prevent war between Salvador and Guatemala.

HOTTEST KILLED A GUEST.

Seattle, Aug. 18.—In attempting to eject Mike Mateosco from her home at Ravensdale Saturday evening Mrs. Joseph Firpe was shot in the abdomen and died on the train while on her way to this city for medical treatment. The shooting followed a house party which was given at the Firpe home.

LAND GRAFTER CONVICTED.

Helena, Mont., Aug. 18.—A jury in the United States court today returned a verdict of guilty in the case of J. T. Carroll, a Butte and Spokane lumberman, on trial the second time on a charge of illegally fencing government lands. Judge Wolverton will pass sentence on Monday.

WHOLESALE SMUGGLING IN OF IMMIGRANTS.

Washington, Aug. 18.—Discovery has been made by James R. Dunn, immigration inspector in charge at St. Louis, of a wholesale smuggling of immigrants from Mexico into the United States. Every one of the immigrants was barred by the law from entering the United States because of trachoma, a contagious disease of the eyes. Officials of the immigration service are now engaged in locating the immigrants who who smuggled into the country, with a view to their deportation.

The case is interesting and extraordinary. A party of 50 Syrians applied for passage to the United States at Naples, Italy. Every one of them was found to be afflicted with trachoma and the steamship company refused to accept them for passage to this country. They were informed that they could go to Mexico and then "work their way" into the United States. On their arrival in Mexico they scattered over the country for a while, but eventually reached the border near Laredo, Tex. They were smuggled across the river above Laredo, the smugglers receiving \$12 a head.

The Syrians were peddlers and began immediately to ply their vocations in this country, going from place to place, thus becoming separated.

Inspector Dunn located a Syrian in St. Louis named Shabade Jacob, who he believed, was unlawfully in the country. When he examined Jacob, the man told a story about having been landed at Philadelphia, but a little investigation showed that that statement was untrue. Confronted with the proof that he had not told the truth, Jacob broke down and told how he and his Syrian friends had been smuggled across the Mexican border. Jacob gave to Inspector Dunn all the names of the party he could remember and officers of the immigration service are now searching for them. Jacob is being held for a time to assist in identifying the other Syrians.

MOVEMENT IS WIDESPREAD.

Those Apprehended Disclaim All Knowledge of Why They Are Held By the Police.

Havana, Aug. 19.—Half a dozen highly prominent leaders of the Liberal party have been taken into custody on the charge of conspiracy against the government and plotting to assassinate President Palma.

The events of today have shown that the government is fully aroused to the necessity of putting down not only the open outlawry in western Cuba, but also of capturing and confining the alleged leaders of this movement, who were strongly suspected of plotting the assassination of the president and overthrowing the present government by force. To that end the six members of the Liberal party were arrested.

The men arrested here are Gen. Carlos Céspedes and his brother Faustino, ex-Cuban consul at Bremen; ex-Senator Montegudo, Con. Manuel Piedra, chief of police in the house of representatives, and Gen. Enrique Loyzaga del Castillo, a former congressman from Pinar del Rio province. These men are charged with conspiracy.

Telegrams were sent to Santiago directing the arrest of Juan Gualberto Gomez of Havana, known as the colored orator, and one of the most influential of the Liberal leaders. Gomez has been campaigning lately throughout Santiago province against the government. The police of Santiago also were ordered to arrest Demetrio Castillo, Gomez and Castillo are charged with inciting to outlawry and revolution.

The Havana arrests were made by the police on charges preferred by the chief of the government secret service, Gen. Enrique Loyzaga del Castillo managed to make his escape.

Col. Manuel Piedra is the same man who endeavored to start a revolution in 1905. He was captured, but subsequently pardoned and singularly enough remained in the employ of the government as chief of police in the house.

Gen. Enrique Loyzaga del Castillo is a radical and on various occasions has been a disturbing element in politics.

The details of this alleged conspiracy are not yet clear. The officials assert they have sufficient evidence to secure convictions.

Dispatches from Santiago that two arrests there were accomplished this afternoon without excitement and without resistance.

It is reported here that the rebels in the province of Pinar del Rio have received reinforcements in the remotest districts. Leading veterans were assembling volunteers to attack and disperse all rebel bands. The rebels hold that the government has been most unjust in the matter of elections and appointments, and the government has not carried out its promises of public improvements, etc. The rebels in the remotest districts are said to be well armed and probably well supplied with ammunition.

Troops are being held in readiness to be transported to Pinar del Rio, and the Western railroad has been notified that a train for this purpose may be requisitioned at any moment. In view of the rumors and evidences of plots the government is loath to send the Havana troops away. The entire force of rural guards numbered 5,000, 500 of whom are scattered through Pinar del Rio province.

A law doubling the size of the rural guards almost passed congress at the last session. It was not acted upon by the senate.

President Palma will sleep in the palace tonight.

The five men arrested here deny all knowledge of why they had been arrested. They declare they are simply the victims of persecution.

The police lieutenant who allowed Gen. del Castillo to escape has been arrested.

The revolutionists in Pinar del Rio province number at least 200 and probably more. Some ammunition and three

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Charged With Conspiring Against Government and Plotting to Assassinate Palma.

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New York, Aug. 20.—A cable dispatch to a morning paper from Havana says that following the arrest yesterday of several prominent men in connection with an alleged conspiracy to assassinate President Palma and overthrow the government, Speaker Freyre had a consultation with President Palma last night and decided to summon an extraordinary session of the house this morning to discuss the uprising.

The dispatch adds: "Numerous bands are joining Pino Guerra."

"A suspicious looking schooner is off Pinar del Rio."

"All the coast roads from Havana are closely guarded. Many motorists who attempted to leave the city yesterday were turned back."

"The rebels have seized the mails of the steamship Consolation."

"The government has established a censorship over press dispatches and all telegrams are delayed. The officials maintain silence as to the situation."

A PECULIAR ACCIDENT.

Blowing Out of Fuse Throws Young Lady to Ground, Breaking Her Neck.

San Francisco, Aug. 19.—The blowing out of a fuse on a Market street car tonight caused the death of Miss Jennie Regan, a sister of Detective Sergeant Regan of the local police department.

Miss Regan boarded the car at the ferry at the foot of Market street, about 9:30 o'clock. When about a block from the ferry building the fuse blew out with a loud detonation, wrapping the front end of the car in a sheet of flame. The young woman was sitting on a seat near the steps and was either thrown or fell off the car. She was immediately taken to the Harbor emergency hospital, a block away, but died in a few minutes. Her neck had been broken by the fall. She was 25 years old.

FATAL AUTO ACCIDENT.

Three Automobiles Killed and One Fatally Injured.

Asbury Park, N. J., Aug. 18.—Three automobiles were killed and another fatally injured at Allaire crossing, on the Pennsylvania railroad near here tonight, when an express train crashed into the automobile of J. George Lafargue, a piano manufacturer of New York City. Mr. Lafargue, his wife and Mrs. Charles Lurch were instantly killed. Mr. Lurch, the only other occupant of the car, was unconscious when he was run over, and is in a precarious condition.

Mr. Lafargue handled the car himself and as the party approached the crossing the car was going at a good speed. As it swept upon the tracks a train crashed into it and the occupants were thrown high into the air. The car was hurled 20 feet and wrecked against the Allaire station.

STACKPOLE SENTENCED TO IMPRISONMENT FOR LIFE.

Los Angeles, Aug. 19.—After deliberating 28 hours, the jury in the case of Ernest G. Stackpole, tried for the murder of his mistress' husband, Joel Scheck, June 14, has returned a verdict of murder in the first degree and fixed the penalty at life imprisonment. The verdict was a disappointment to the prosecution.

This morning, after 20 hours' discussion and frequent voting, the situation had not altered from that expressed by the first ballot—10 for conviction, and several hours after the twelfth juror's compromise, life imprisonment was accepted.

Mrs. Arilla Scheck, Stackpole's confessed accomplice in the commission of the crime, will be tried next.

Gen. Rodriguez, commander of the rural guards, at the conclusion of a conference with President Palma, held at a late hour tonight, said to the associated Press:

"I regret to say our troops were obliged to fight rebels again today. None as far as we know. We are not aware what the other side suffered. They were scattered and fled. There were two encounters. One took place at Punta Gorda and the other at San Juan de Martinez."

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SEVEN KILLED, SEVEN INJURED

A Fast Freight on the Pennsylvania Crashes Into a Freight Train.

PLOWED RIGHT THROUGH IT.

"For God's Sake Kill Me and Put Me Out of My Misery," Cried One Victim.

Johnstown, Pa., Aug. 18.—Plunging through a blinding rainstorm at the rate of 45 miles an hour early today, a fast freight train on the Pennsylvania railroad crashed into a slowly moving work train at Sang Hollow, killing seven and seriously injuring seven others of the work train crew. Three of the latter probably will die.

The work train had stopped to take water. The freight was following and because of the rain the engineer was unable to see the work train until he was too late to stop.

The freight train plowed its way through the work train. All of those on the work train were asleep, and the killed probably never knew what happened.

According to reports Engineer S. N. Woods of the freight train had increased the speed of his train and had exceeded his orders. He jumped and was fatally hurt.

Some of the injured, who had been thrown from their bunks to the side of the train, were crying and moaning on the ground.

One man lay against the side of the train badly crushed and kept crying feebly for his wife and child. The engine lay on its side, belching streams of hot water and clouds of steam, which enveloped several of the injured men on the ground.

With all haste the wreckage was lifted away from the injured men. One of these, a one-legged man, was pinned under a timber from the derrick and terribly crushed. Calling one of the wreckers to him he said:

"For God's sake kill me and put me out of my misery. I can't live, anyway. Please don't let my wife know I am hurt. She is away on her vacation and it would be a shame for me to spoil things for her."

Part of the last car on the work train was thrown 150 feet up a hill at the point of the wreck and one set of trucks had been hurled in an opposite direction 15 feet into the river.
