Work for the Laborer.

Editors Dear Sirs:

A very important subject is

awakening an interest in the minds

of some of our thinking men, namely

employment for the laborer. Will

you please indulge me with room

for a few of my reflections, if you

deem them worth reading?

Everybody seems to think that

our resources are ample in this ter-

ritory, and are full of flattering

promises to the enterprising, and if

somebody with money, some capital-

ist would only come here and in-

vest, then our success and prosper-

ity would be established, and we

would be able to forget the old adage

that "the money is not in the land."

As a people we came to this coun-

try without money, and founded a

nation. We have sent from our

five hundred teams to the Missouri

river each season for years; brought

to this country thousands of immi-

grants at the cost of hundreds of

thousands of dollars; and all the

labor and home production. Had

money been required, we could not

have accomplished these things. But

now we seem to have almost

concluded that nothing can be done

without money, when the fact is,

labor properly applied can be

made to accomplish almost every-

thing. A writer on the same sub-

ject says, correctly, that "the pro-

gress of a country or people is

an individual, in its exact propor-

tion to the amount of labor intelli-

gently applied."

To what shall we apply our labor?

to taking up the land and farming?

Is not farming overdone in this

territory? We are producing more

than we consume, and in disposing

of the surplus we are not obtaining

remunerative prices. Then our im-

migrants are not farmers, generally,

but from the railroad, manufactur-

ing districts of the east, hence we

should be endeavoring to encour-

age, build, and own our railroads.

Could not our farmers, mechan-

ics and laborers organize their

means and energies, and while

part of our population is making

the grade and furnishing the ties for

a railroad from York to the iron

forms.

The first form is that of a

Family Record,

With ruled and printed spaces for

births, marriages, and deaths, in

each family, also for names, date

and places, one page accommodat-

ing one family.

The second form is a

Church Record,

With spaces for baptisms,

confirmations, ordinations, endow-

ments, and patriarchal blessings

and various particulars of the same.

The third form is a

Sealing Record,

With spaces for names of person

sealed, birth, death, time, place,

etc.

The fourth form is a

Baptism for the Dead

Record,

With spaces for names, dates, birth,

death, baptism, confirmation, etc.

Each book is furnished with a

title page, on which the person

owning the record can enter his or

her name. An explanation of the

forms, or instructions how to keep

the record, is also printed in each

book, and the pages are numbered

substantially bound in full sheep,

English, red, or black. We can

furnish them in any size, from one

to five quires or larger, but prob-

ably five quires is as large as will be

desired. We can also furnish the

various forms in a record, propor-

tioned to each other to order.
