

A GREAT GATHERING

Night Uprising of the People of the
Theater Last Night.

THOUSANDS TURNED OUT.

Request Speeches by Major Bascom,
Bates, Whittemore, Van Horne,
McNally, Campbell, Hill, Whitmer,
Timmons and Others.

Last night's grand rally and ratification of the Citizens' tasks at the Theater indicated how strong the patriotic pulse beats in Salt Lake, and it is taken as a sure sign that it will sweep everything before it as election day. The mighty uprising of people of all political faiths and persuasions is without a parallel in the history of such gatherings in the Territory. The theater was packed again and now exclusively that personal locomotion was in many instances an absolute impossibility. On the stage and round hundreds of citizens facing the tremendous audience that filled every room of every hall that was said and applauded and cheered every point that was made, and there were many citizens. Everybody was good natured and when justified by the crowd would join it as a matter of course. It proved one thing beyond doubt and that was that all were united by one sympathy and sympathy for principles that uniting about a restoration in the government of city affairs. It was an awful rebuke to the men who were discredited and disgraced by their treachery, and they will never be other than men of infamy to young men.

Flag, hunting and natural flowers adorned the scene while citizens on which the following inscription appeared: "A grand gathering of the people of the City of Salt Lake." The platform printed of the Internal organization was now a list of its past failures.

"We want a government of the people, not of the politicians."

"Our desire is that our officials and managers be honest and impartial."

"A public official is a public servant and not an arbitrary ruler."

This meeting was called promptly to order at 8 o'clock by Mr. D. C. Durst, who introduced Mr. Williams as chairman. The latter, after giving a few words in favor of his Citizens' movement, said that it was purely a business procession. He was a man of strong pulpit, particularly, but in the interior offices of the church he had no influence whatever. He was a member of the city council, a Deacon, a Hesperian, Presbyter or what not, as long as he was named, resolute and energetic. The present mighty uprising, he said, was the result of the Citizens' task that had brought him into a social being, and placed the wreath of a diabolist. The speakers then informed. Major Bascom was the most popular, and his speech was the greatest success of the night. The power of government was the best; that it had within its system the power to correct the evils that sometimes afflict states, counties and municipalities. It was not within the range of possibility that we could have a better government than the one we had, if only the right men were chosen.

The speaker then informed Major Bascom that his party might be asked in the selection of men, but for office, that will be honest, their meetings with the people. It is the duty of every party that places numbers, ward meetings and towns elected, stated at large. When they did so foolish and corruption would follow. It was now the time for the people to judge of their own worth, and to decide them to instruction to watch their leaders. Had the nation of Salt Lake City been honest and reasonably well informed, then the mighty gathering last night would have been a failure.

Major Williams, the first speaker, was dressed in a black suit, and the dress of a lawyer. He was a man of great energy and eloquence, and his speech was well received. He said that the party had only been fit to accommodate itself with (Mormon) Leaven, and those, "stray members," were the weed in the whole lot. (Laughter and applause.)

He said, we are very much kind, but less in opposition to God of the Council. They were attributable to him because he sought to way these various extraneous influences, but in particular dispensed contradiction from the city was now placed.

"Now friends and fellow citizens, if you, too, feel that I am in any way responsible, I want you to remember that we make me a man of God, and not a man of the world."
