claims of James Clary and six others who said they had claims against Watson Bros. and G. O. W. Showell, for labor performed by them on City Creek and North Temple street, saying that he found the facts to he that Wat-son Bros. had nothing to do with the matter whatever; that Watson had the contract with the city to perform the contract with the city to perform the work and that Showell was a sub-contractor under him to do a certain pertion thereof; that the work was completed, and the city has jaid Watson for the same, and Watson had settled with Showell in full for his part of the work; that the petitioners have no claim against the city; that all of sald petitioners were employed by Showell, and he alone is responsible to them. Concluding, he said:

"I do not recognize the liability of the city in any case under garnishee process, nor do I think it is legally bound by such process when served up-on it or any of its officers. I would recommend, however, that in all cases where contractors fail or refuse to pay the men, that the city, when garnished for the laborers' wages in future, waive that legal right and hold the money back for their protection against the employer. Contractors who do intend to and who do not take care of Contractors who do the laborers can, of course, take contracts at lower figures than those who pay for the labor, but I take it that the city does not approve of any such
