NEWS FROM THE JUNCTION CITY.

ORDER, June 30th, 1886. FIRST DISTRICT COURT.

Pursuant to adjournment, the court met this morning at 10 o'clock. The attendance was rather slim at the commencement. At 20 minutes past ten, the GRAND JURY

was then called. In response to their names—three of the number being called up and was asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon him.
