Copper metal declined to a new low level, at 12% for lake, but without bringing any sales. St. Paul stock was particularly weak. In the steel shares alone did the results seem to be any buying of importance. On the curb market Standard Oil broke to a new low record of 401, de-clining 12 points on the day, while Gragenheim Exploration scored a loss of 50 points. Several large accounts in which smelter stock figures us col-lateral are being closed out. In the foreign markets there was weakness in American stocks at the close, although they were not very ac-tive. Wheat broke nearly 2 cents a bushel, but cotton was steady. The total number of shares of stock sold foday on the New York stock exchange mounted to 1,097,134 against 1,306,200 the same day last year.
