Last winter when the mercury was deg. below zero a thermometer in-erted into a cluster of bees showed a emperature of 65 deg. on the inside and 45 deg. heat generated by the bees could be maintained at that degree with an out-side temperature[of 10 deg. Fahrenheit, what must it be with the thermometer at 90 deg.? This is the way bees man-age to reduce it, or at leffst to secure cool, pure air: A number of bees, a thousand or more, perhaps act as ven-tilators or fanners. They stand head down, at an angle of 45 deg., and keep their wings in motion. Throughout all the combs, up and down, the ven-filiators keep their fans going. On the alighting boards, with borders point-ing away from the hive, they fan also. At the entrance of one hive, on a day in August, 280 bees, by actual count, were fanning. The honey-gather-ers dropped down upon them, tum-bled over them, but they kept to their work. Some writers have spoken of the "hum of the hive," as though the hum was the result of the "work going on within. 'Twas the ham of the fan-ners. But in August last year fibere were nights when the hives were silent. Not an echo of a hum came from any, showing that the sir was cool enough
