

PRACTICAL RESULTS OF NATURE STUDY

Children Become Actively Interested in Their Surroundings.

HOW FRUIT IS CLASSIFIED.

Synopsis of Teachers' Training Lesson At the University of Utah Yesterday.

The educational value of the nature study in schools is that it substitutes the activity of the child for the didactic of the teacher, develops the active instead of the passive attitude of the learner, and changes the method of the teacher from that of demonstration to that of suggestion. The value of developing very early a love of nature is to make a lover of the student, so that he will find a worthy interest in some form of nature, love that will add a sparkle to the eye, elasticity to the step and a glow to every heart-beat, a passport to enjoyment everywhere, a safeguard against idleness and temptation at all times.

Such was the drift of the conversation about Prof. Cummings' lecture yesterday at the U. of U.

CLASSIFICATION OF FRUITS.

Thus it was shown at the last lesson of the classification of fruits, as of everything else in nature work, should be home-made, made by the class from the specimens. Thus fruits are classified as large or small, as sweet or sour; and these are legitimate and scientific. But the best basis is structure, which reveals the underlying facts of relationship not otherwise obvious. Thus, we classify a tomato by observing first its covering, we cut it open and observe the pulp with the seeds diffused through it. In the case of the apple a similar procedure reveals a core containing the seeds. The apple reveals a stone containing the seeds. A melon has a rind rather than a skin, a pulp, and seeds not mingled in the pulp. Thus we have four groups: the berry, the pome, the drupe and the nut. Under these heads we would classify most of the common fruits.

WHY THESE KINDS EXIST.

The covering indicates the kind and amount of protection needed by the fruit. That the skin is a protection from insect enemies is seen in the case of the apple, which is rarely penetrated by the worm or the codling moth except at the end where the skin is not continuous. The rind of the squash, which is frequently strong enough to sustain the weight of a man, is made strong to suit its environment. The leathery partitions surrounding the apple seed may have the effect of causing certain animals that eat them to spit out some of the seeds seeking to get rid of the bony substances.

PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS.

The children are led to see why the raspberries are packed in cases smaller than those containing strawberries, why some fruits are crated on one way, some another, what varieties of fruit are best for size quality and profit; what kinds of raspberries, strawberries, apples, pears, peaches, etc., should be bought for stocking an orchard, what difference in value per acre a choice of the best kind would make, etc. In all cases, the children may bring samples of the various kinds, so that they learn the names and the characteristics of the different varieties, their commercial value, and other facts.

DEATH OF MRS. GRIFFITH.

Pioneer Woman Died as a Result of Whooping Cough Attack.

Mrs. Margaret Price Griffith, wife of Joseph Griffith of Lake Point, Tooele county, Utah, died at the family residence at Lake Point after a painful sickness of several months' duration, caused by contracting a severe case of whooping cough. She was 73 years and 6 months old, and has been a member of the Church for the greater part of her life. She was born in Cheshire, England, where she was married to Joseph Griffith. With her husband she soon after emigrated to Utah. They settled first in Salt Lake City where they resided about three years and then removed to Lake Point, formerly called E. T., where they have lived for over 42 years. She is survived by her husband, Joseph Griffith, aged 76 years, and seven children, Mrs. Thomas J. Everill, the Misses Nellie and Margaret Griffith, and Joseph Griffith of Salt Lake City, Mrs. Brigham, Mrs. John and Charles Griffith of Lake Point, and also 27 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. The funeral services will be held at the Lake Point mortuary Sunday, June 24, 1906, at 12 noon. Friends are respectfully invited to attend.

SOMETHING MORE ABOUT STACKPOLE

Believed That He Attempted to Blackmail Senator Clark.

SENT TO THE PENITENTIARY

In San Quentin and Served a Term There for Robbery—How Murder Was Committed.

Ernest Stackpole, the man who is under arrest in Los Angeles for the murder of his paramour's husband, Jack Schack, is believed to be the same Ernest Stackpole who, 19 or 12 years ago, attempted to blackmail Senator Clark's family, and who afterward served a term in San Quentin penitentiary for robbery. The Butte Stackpole has lived in Los Angeles for some time, and only a few weeks ago he met and introduced himself to several Butte men who were visiting in that city. People in Butte who knew Stackpole and who have seen the picture of the murderer printed in the Los Angeles papers said last night that the picture was a sufficiently good likeness of the man they had known 18 years ago to leave little doubt that he is the man under arrest.

SENSATIONAL AFFAIR.

The press dispatches from Los Angeles have for three or four days devoted much attention to the sensational murder. It is known that Stackpole, who is a man about 35 years of age, and Mrs. Arilla Schack, a married woman 19 years old, had been intimate for some time and planned the murder of the woman's husband. The crime was committed last Thursday, June 14, but the pair was not arrested until Saturday. After the inquest and the burial of the murdered man, the woman made a complete confession, claiming that Stackpole had a hypnotic influence over her. The murder was committed before Schack had left his bed. The woman says that, with Stackpole, she planned the murder of her husband, and that she was in the kitchen when the first shot was fired, but saw Stackpole place his revolver to Schack's head and fire the second shot.

THE PLOT.

Stackpole is believed to have first conceived the plan to murder Schack, and it was easy to influence the woman to join him in the plan, as both were anxious to get rid of her husband and to secure his life insurance money. At the appointed time she let Stackpole into the house through the kitchen door and remained in the back room, while he entered the bedroom and shot him in the breast. The woman confessed that she stood in the kitchen with her fingers in her ears so she would not hear the death cry of her husband.

A COLD-BLOODED MURDER.

When the first shot was fired she entered the bedroom and at that instant Schack raised up and looked his murderer full in the face. Seeing that his work had not been finished, Stackpole placed the revolver against Schack's head and fired, killing him instantly. The sight of her husband after he was dead, and the realization that she had assisted in his murder, completely unnerved the woman and she became hysterical. It was the original intention of the murderers to tell the police that Schack had committed suicide. When the second shot was fired, however, they saw that this story would have to be changed, and so Stackpole invented the burglary story.

It is stated that Stackpole has become defiant, and denies all statements made by the woman and also those previously made by himself.

About 12 years ago a letter was received by the officials of the Clark bank demanding \$50,000 and directing the money to be delivered at a certain place. The threat was made that if the money was not sent the bank would be blown up and a member of the Clark family kidnapped.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

The police soon found evidence to connect Stackpole with the letter, and he was arrested, but never prosecuted. It is stated that he was released because of the influence of his father, who was then a resident of Butte. From Butte young Stackpole went to California and committed a highway robbery there. Four years ago a party of Butte people on an excursion to the coast and to Honolulu saw Stackpole in San Quentin penitentiary. Two weeks ago Stackpole was seen in Los Angeles by one of the men who had seen him in the California penitentiary—Anaconda Standard.

BOYS ARE AHEAD.

Report of City Board of Health for Week Ending June 23.

Report of city board of health for week ending June 23: Thirty-one births were reported during the week; 17 males and 14 females. Twenty-three deaths were reported; 10 males and 13 females; three shipped here from other cities.

There were reported 11 cases of contagious and infectious diseases, consisting of two cases of smallpox; two cases of scarlet fever; eight cases of diphtheria; one case of chickenpox and one case of whooping cough. Ten cases of smallpox, four cases of scarlet fever, eight cases of diphtheria and one case of epidemic cerebro spinal meningitis remain in quarantine.

WOULD BE GOVERNOR.

Mayor McDonald of Meeteetse Also Becomes a Candidate.

Meeteetse, Wyo., June 23.—The gubernatorial race was still further complicated this week when Mayor Angus J. McDonald of this place announced his candidacy. This makes four candidates in the field—Gov. B. B. Brooks, the present incumbent, State Treasurer W. C. Irvine, James E. Casagrand and Mayor McDonald. The latter is very strong in northern Wyoming, and in the event the northern half of the state is recognized, the nomination would go to the Meeteetse man. It is believed, however, that the main contest is between Brooks, Casagrand and Irvine. In the event of a deadlock McDonald's candidacy would assume some magnitude.
