

TALK OF THE TOWN.

The dust is nicely settled. Thunder, lightning and rain. Ogden is holding a Primary Fair. The High Council meets this evening. The Tabernacle Choir practices to night. The First District Court is in session at Provo. Rain during the night, and more this morning. The opera of "Patience" will be presented for a matinee to-morrow afternoon. When one mistakes through ignorance, he errs; when he knowingly lies, he lies. A gentleman from Tooele reports a very bad horse near Brighton. It should be fixed, as it is almost impossible. The proprietor of a Chinese wash-house was before Justice Pyper to-day, for permitting a nuisance near his premises. Sir James Bain, of Glasgow, Scotland, who has been spending two or three days in Salt Lake, left this afternoon for the West. The Hebrew New Year, "Rosh Hashana," commences at sundown this evening. The Jews will suspend business for two days. A fund has been started to collect means to erect a monument to the late President Garfield. Ogden has taken the initiative in Utah, and for aught we know, in the whole Union. Hon. S. A. Mann, ex-Governor of Utah Territory, and one of the few worthies of being called the Governor of the people, died last week at Reno, Nevada. He has many friends here, who will deeply regret his demise. Governor Murray has seconded the proclamation of President Garfield, appointing Monday, the 23rd, a day of humiliation and mourning, in memory of the late President Garfield, whose remains will be buried on that day, at Cleveland, Ohio. Gen. E. M. Barrum, for many years a resident of this city, where he practiced law, died about noon to-day. He has been prostrate with liver complaint for several weeks, during which time he suffered severely. He was about 55 years of age.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

District Court.—Proceedings in the Third District Court, on Friday, September 23d, 1881, Chief Justice Hunter presiding: Empanelling of Grand Jury postponed till to-morrow. Singer Manufacturing Co. vs. Frederick Scott et al.; default and judgment against defendant Scott. Edward Hall vs. J. E. Dooley et al.; demurrer to complaint argued and submitted. Excelsior Mfg Co. vs. J. N. Barker; motion for new trial by plaintiff argued. Still in progress.

Wedding Reception.—The wedding reception of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Young, at the residence of the bride's parents, 17th Ward, last evening, was attended by a multitude of their friends and was all that could be desired. The house and grounds were brilliantly illuminated and filled with gay and happy guests, who passed away the pleasant hours with a variety of amusements. The affair was a grand success in every way. Mr. and Mrs. Young have taken up their residence in their handsome new house, on North Temple Street, 18th Ward, where their many friends may find them in the future.

"Madame Favart."—This fine opera was presented by the Melville Combination, for the first time in this city, last evening. The house was well filled, and the performance with a few exceptions passed off smoothly. Some of the troupe, we are informed, had never played in the piece before, which doubtless accounts for the defects that were noticeable. The opera is very pleasing, but should have been better rehearsed. Those who showed to best advantage were Miss Melville, Miss Post, Mr. Freeman and Mr. Cassell. To-night "Prince Methusalem," the leading part in which is a favorite role of Miss Melville's will be performed. It was presented on the occasion of her benefit, in San Francisco, last Friday evening. It should draw a good audience.

Counterfeits.—To all those who are engaged in business it is perhaps unnecessary to remark that there are many counterfeit bills in circulation, and that new ones are continually being issued. The inevitable result of flooding the country with these "counterfeit presentments" is that some one must lose by the operation, as eventually the government will infallibly reject all such bills. Mr. James Hoover, of Denver, Colorado, who is now in the city, is undoubtedly an expert in exposing these spurious fabrications. We understand that he offers \$100 for any counterfeit that he cannot detect. To business men the information which he is prepared to impart ought to be a consideration of eminent importance. We can confidently assure our readers, from personal observation that, although he makes no pretensions to music, Mr. Hoover is most thoroughly posted in regard to "what notes" and stands fully prepared to detect an impossible barrier between the "false" and "sharp."

THE INSANE ASYLUM.—From the Enquirer, we learn the result of the meeting held in Provo last Saturday evening, by the Board of Directors of the Territorial Insane Asylum. President R. T. Burton occupied the chair. All the directors were present excepting Governor Murray and Col. J. R. Winder. The members had first visited the site chosen for the proposed edifice before convening at the Court House. The report of the committee on the purchase of a site was presented and adopted. It showed that title to about thirty-three acres of land had been secured, leaving about seven acres yet to secure, title to which would be transferred as soon as the present owner's title was perfected. The thirty-three acres had been purchased at a cost of \$1,801.10. The report also stated that the sum of \$2,000 had been appropriated by Utah County to the purposes of the Asylum; also \$500 by Provo City, which amounts were now made subject to the order of the Board. On motion the sum of \$2,000 and \$500 were gratefully accepted by the Board on behalf of the Territory, and the Secretary was instructed to draw the said amounts for the purposes indicated. The report of the committee on plans and specifications was then accepted, and Dr. J. M. Benedict, who was present, stated that the plan drafted by the architect, Mr. John H. Burton, and adopted by the Board, was known as the Improved Linear form and highly recommended by such eminent medical authorities as Drs. Gray and Kirkwood. The plan is after that of the State Asylum of Michigan, at Kalamazoo, and consists of a central or main building and two wings. These wings are made of two longitudinal and two transverse sections each. The building will be fire-proof, as far as the materials at hand will allow of it being made so. It having been provided by the last Legislature for the building of only a portion of such a structure, in view of meeting the present requirements, and \$25,000 only being available by appropriation, the Board decided on proceeding with the work of constructing the first longitudinal and transverse sections lying south of the proposed central building. This portion of the building itself will be three stories high, above the waterable, and 155 feet long including the west wing of the transverse section, running east from west, it will be 108 feet long. The foundation and basement are to be constructed of red sandstone from Spanish Fork quarries, or of ordinary building rock of suitable arrangements for the former cannot be made. The superstructure will be of red brick. The Asylum, completed, is designed to accommodate 200 patients. A building committee, consisting of Messrs. W. N. Dusenberry, W. R. Smith and J. R. Winder, was appointed, with instructions to advertise for bids for such labor and material as were requisite to put in the basement before the coming winter, and accomplish as much more as their facilities and the season of the year would warrant it. The engineer was instructed to make the necessary surveys in view of establishing a system of sewerage, to ascertain the amount of water supply to be derived from Oak Springs, and offer recommendations in regard to a reservoir.

PROCLAMATION.—Whereas, Monday next has been designated by proclamation of this day, under the hand of President Arthur, for the solemn final obsequies of our beloved and lamented late Chief Magistrate, James A. Garfield, and set apart as a day of "humiliation and mourning," to be observed throughout the United States; Now, therefore, in accordance therewith, and that we as a people may be enabled further to pay our tribute of sorrowful respect to his endeared memory, and the better to reflect upon the lesson of this our great national calamity: I, Eli H. Murray, Governor of the Territory of Utah, do hereby appoint Monday, the 23rd day of September, 1881, as a day of humiliation and mourning, and do recommend the entire suspension of business upon that day in the Territory of Utah, and that the people gather in their respective places of public worship for the observance of the ceremonies that become the sad season. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the Territory of Utah to be affixed. Done at the City of Salt Lake, this 23rd day of September, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-One.
