DEN Y. SMITH ADJUDGED GUILTY-JAS. MOYLE AND G. H. TAYLOR GIVE THEIR OWN TESTIMONY.

yesterday, closed with the testimony of James Hilton was the next witness: He said-I know defendant; have knowa him since 1874; have a sister named Annie; she lives in the Third Ward; have not been there for about

months ago, as I was driving past her house; got acquainted with the defendant at my mother's house; saw him there two or three times; my sister left mother's house about ten or eleven years ago, I believe; she went to live in the Third Ward, I believe, when she left mother's.

Witness Lewis, continuing—The defendant made a statement, saying that during 1883 he had lived with the women as maked in the complaint. He said that Annie Hilton was his third wife. Witness-I did not live with Annie Hilton during 1883; I went there with provisions, etc., probably once a week; don't think I was there in the evening during that year. Did not have intercourse with her during that year.

Mr. Dickson—Is it not a fact that you did contemplate, within the pass month, coming into court and pleading gullty to this indictment?

Witness—II contemplated pleading

guilty to this indictment?
Witness—Il contemplated pleading guilty to this indictment, by advice. I dont think I lived with Annie Hilton during 1883—I would not swear to it.
The case was then submitted without argument, the jury retired and in about 20 minutes came back with a verdict of guilty.
Sentence was fixed for February27th, and the court adjourned until 10 a.m. to-day.

This morning the time of sentencing Samuel H. B. Smith was deferred un-til Saturday, February 20th, at 10 a.m. The case of the United States vs.


