SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

A portable electric plant for fixing rails and packing sleepers, the invention of A. Collet of Paris, is in use on several French railways. The apparatus runs on wheels adaptable for ordinary roads or railway tracks, and includes a 25-horse power steam engine, which is coupled by a belt to the dynamo that generates electric current. Steam is supplied by a vertical tubular boiler of a capacity of only 155 gallons. The engine being in place, a copper circuit is carried along the permanent way three-fifths of a mile on folding ladders, and a continuous current of 220 volts is led to the track laying machine. With two wood-screw machines on a small track, four men lay 12.5 yards of track in 10 minutes, setting 20 screws, this being seven times the rate by hand. The screw-driving tool gives 400 strokes per minute, and enables six men to pack a sleeper in broken stone in one minute or in sand in 35 seconds.

The novel gun-sight of Sir Howard Grubb sets upon the principle of the camera lucida, and projects an apparent image of a white cross upon the target. The cross is stretched upon a translucent screen on the top of the instrument, the rays of light being bent by double refraction so as to appear suspended in air just in front of the object toward which the gun points. The cross is sharply defined, although the eye is focused on the distant object. This sight's superiority is in appearing as distinct as the target, so that when they are superposed, due allowance being made for elevation, the gun is correctly aimed.

An interesting hygrometer is made by dipping a strip of cotton in a solution of 1 part of cobalt chloride, 77 of nickel oxide and 20 of gelatine in 200 of water. The strip is green in dry weather, fading as moisture appears.

The carbolic acid of the atmosphere offers problems that A. Krogh, a Danish physiologist, believes to be of great importance. Twice as much of this gas is found in the air of Greenland as in that of temperate regions, and the excess seems to come from the deep sea, where it is stored under pressure, but the cause of this storage and the exact place of origin are unknown. The proportion of carbolic acid in the air at Kew has varied in a series of years from 2.43 to 2.66 parts in 10,000. It is greater in winter than in summer, at high pressure than when the barometer is low, and is constantly changing. It is believed that its fluctuations at certain parts of the year may have a decided bearing upon agriculture, but knowledge may not enable us to regulate the supply, but some day we may be able to forestall the autumn crop simply from our knowledge of the proportion of carbolic acid during some month or fortnight.

The luminosity of certain marine microbes of the Baltic has been proven by M. Tschernoff, a Russian physiologist, to depend on respiration and oxygen absorption. On injecting a culture of the microbes into the blood of a number of frogs, the latter, supplying the necessary oxygen, were made luminous at night.



