SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

A portable electric plant for fixing rails and packing sleepers, the invention of A. Collet of Paris, is in use on several French railways. The apparatus runs on wheels adaptable for ordinary roads or railwy tracks, and includes a 25-horse or ratiwy tracks, and includes a 25-horse power steam engine, which is coupled by a belt to the dynamo that generates electric current. Steam is supplied by a vertical jubular boiler of a capacity of only 15% gallons. The engine being in place, a copper circuit is carried along the permanent way three-fifths of a mills on folding ladders, and a con-tinuous current of 220 volts is led to the thick laying machines. With two wood-screw machines on a small track, four men lay 19.7 yards of track in 10 minutes, setting 200 screws, this being seven times the rate by hand. The sleeper-packing tool gives 409 strokes Eleeper-packing tool gives 400 strokes per minute, and enables six men to pack a sleeper in broken stone iu one minute or in sand in 35 seconds.

The novel gun-sight of Sir Howard Grabb acts upon the principle of the cumera locida, and projects an appar-ent image of a white cross upon the target. The cross is stratched upon a translucent screen on the tap of the instrument, the rays of light being bent Instrument, the rays of light being bent by double refraction so as to appear suspended in air just in front of the object toward which the gun points. The cross is sharply defined, although the cyc is focussed on the distant ab-fect. This sight's superiority is in ap-pearing as distant as the target, so that when they are superposed, due allow-ance being inside for viewation, the gun is correctly almed. is correctly almed.

An interesting hygremeter is made by dipping a strip of calleo in a solu-tion of 1 part of cohalt chloride, 77 of nickel oxide and 20 of gelatine in 200 of water. The strip is green in fin-weather, fading as moisture appears.

The carbonic acid of the atmosphere The carbonic acid of the atmosphere offers problems that A. Krogh, a inne-ish physicist, believes to be of great importance. Twice as much of this gas is found in the air of Greenland as in that of temperate regions, and the excess seems to come from the deep sea, where it is stored under preasure, but the cause of this storage and the exact place of order are unknown. The exact place of origin are unknown. The proportion of carbonic acid in the air at Kew has varied in a series of years from 2.43 to 3.50 parts in 10.000. It is greater in winner than in summer, at greater in where than in summer, at high pressure than when the barometer is low, and is constantly changing. It is believed that its fluctuations at cer-tatio parts of the year may have a de-cided bearing upon astricuiture, Greater knowledge may not chable its to regu-late the supply, but some day we may be able to forstell the autumn crops simply from our knowledge of the pro-portion of carbonic acid during some month or forstells.

The luminosity of certain marine mi-crobes of the Baltic has been proven by M. Tarchanoff, a Russian physiologist, to depend on respiration and oxygen absorption. On injecting a culture of the microbes into the blood of a num-bar of frogs, the latter, supplying the necessary oxygen, were made luminous arc dish at night.
